

LEADERS FIGHT ON LA FOLLETTE

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3. — (AP) — Failure so far of a number of their party colleagues to fall in line with the plan of senate republican leaders to recognize the republicanism of Senator-elect La Follette of Wisconsin, is threatening to produce some troubled waters for the party conference next Saturday.

Senator Butler of Massachusetts, chairman of the republican national committee, is one of those apparently still on the fence on the question of treating the Wisconsin senator as a party regular in committee assignments and other matters. He has declined to commit himself, however, further than to say that the matter is still one for "consultation."

Leaders who are endeavoring to submerge the issue include Senator Curtis of Kansas, the majority leader, Senator Moses of New Hampshire, president pro-tempore of the senate, and Senator Jones of Washington, the republican whip.

With some senators insisting, however, that Mr. La Follette's speeches in his recent campaign constituted attacks on the president and the republican party, Senator Watson of Indiana, vice chairman of the conference, is still studying his campaign utterances.

MITCHELL TRIAL IS NEARING END

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3. — (AP) — The Mitchell court martial followed the trial of the Shenandoah court of inquiry today, inquiring in many places the same field previously explored by the navy court.

While the naval inquiry sought to fix responsibility of the Shenandoah wreck, however, the army court had as its objective the rebuttal of Colonel Mitchell's charges that the Shenandoah accident was the result of general incompetency and criminal negligence in conducting the national defense.

Lieutenant Commander Charles E. Rosendahl, senior surviving officer of the Shenandoah, and navigation officer of the ship during its fatal mid-west flight, related to the court martial today many details of the wreck. He was called as a prosecution witness.

County Schools to Decide on Vacation
