SPARK ARRESTER LAW IS DROPPED

Powell Urges Adoption but Council Hold Ordinance Discriminating

The now notorious "spark arrester" ordinance, a city law which would have forced the Lorenz Plumbing company to install an adequate spark arresting device on the stacks of the City Heating plant, was turned down cold by the city council last night.

Just one councilman spoke in its favor. He was Councilman Z. J. Powell.

"I move its adoption," Powell motioned when the ordinance was called for consideration.

There was a silence, a long and studied rumination about the council table. Alderman Roberts turned to Powell and said:

Roberts' Position
"I have studied over this thing for a long while and these are my conclusions. If we passed this spark arrester ordinance, it would mean that all lumber plants within the city limits would have to construct spark arresting devices over their burners, which have a diameter of from 30 to 40 feet. It would be a large and useless expenditure of money for them.

"By passing this ordinance it would be discrimination against the Lorenz Plumbing company, if we forced them to erect spark arresters and let the lumber concerns go scot free; on the other hand it would be an injustice to the lumber companies if we forced them to put up arresters.

"For that reason I am against the spark arrester ordinance as it now stands."

Stuckey Agrees
Councilman Stuckey indicated that that was his position also. Councilman Balsiger remained silent.

"Well," Powell heatedly asked Roberts, "how much more time are you going to give the heating plant to rectify the nuisance of cinders and soot, 15 or 20 years?"

"I'll tell you, Doc," Roberts answered, "if I could have it rectified in 15 minutes I would do it, but I don't see how we would be justified in accomplishing that end by this particular ordinance."

Peyton Supports Lorenz
Oscar Peyton spoke a few words on behalf of the Lorenz company, holding that the cinder and soot nuisance from the heating plant was not noticeable to residents living adjacent to the plant.

"If you drive these people out of business oil burners will predominate," he said. "Then you will see what a real nuisance is."

"That's my position," Stuckey remarked, and with that parting shot the matter was dropped.

STATE SENATOR TELLS CLUB OF CITY MANAGER

La Grande, Oregon, has prospered and developed under the city manager plan of city government. It was established at a time when the city's financial condition was poor and when the rapidly growing town needed an experienced guiding hand.

This was the message to the Rotary club this noon from Bruce Dennis, resident of La Grande and state senator from Wallawa county. Senator Dennis declared that any city that established the city manager plan was better off, and used his personal knowledge of La Grande's experience as an example.

However, he said, there were some features of the La Grande system that could be improved. Instead of three commissioners elected at large, he advocated the election of five commissioners or councilmen as the title might be, from districts or wards. In this way, he pointed out, better representation of the entire city can be secured in the city government.
