THE PEOPLE BE —

The city council again showed its determination to let the people affected go to the devil and serve the private interests that seem to have the majority of the membership under their thumb. Councilman Powell failed in his efforts last night to bring about a passage of the ordinance providing for the installation of a spark arrester at the steam plant. This plant has been a nuisance and a menace to that part of the city. The council was so informed by Fire Chief Ambrose, whose word should have been accepted without question. The people have protested, petitioned and demanded, but the council refuses to listen. The latest excuse is that it will interfere with the operations of the lumber companies. This impediment may easily be overcome by making the ordinance apply to property within the first district, and then include the block where the plant is located within the fire limits, if it is not already there. If the members of the council will try and give the same consideration to the general public that they do to those who are using the city for their private interests, they will be doing that for which they have been elected. If they can't do that then they should hand in their resignations and make room for men who, like Powell, will serve all the city and not a favored few.

GARBAGE GRAB?

Why is the council so anxious to hand "Bill" Lee and his associates the city garbage contract? As sop for the defeat meted out to his candidate for the council from the second ward? Reward for his efforts to place the council beyond the veto power of the mayor?

The present contractor has given efficient service. He has been reasonable in his charges. He is entitled to a continuation of the present contract. Under the proposed change, the restaurants and other business houses will have to pay a considerable advance in the price now charged, yet they have not been notified, nor have they been called into a hearing with the council for the purpose of ascertaining their views. It looks as if the council wanted to hand to the county assessor a valuable contract, penalizing those who must use his services without consulting those who must foot the bill.

Councilman Powell is right in the stand he is taking. He is early showing a disposition to be fair, to safeguard the interests of the people at large, to act as a stop-gap against the use of the city as a pawn in the hands of those who want to use it for private gain. His demand that a hearing be had on the garbage contract should be granted by the council and this odoriferous transaction receive the airing it needs.

EDGEWOOD RANCH FREE FROM DEBT

Bob Coyne Works Wonders
With His New Property
on Swan Lake

For the first time in many a day Edgewood ranch, in Swan lake valley, can, figuratively, raise its head and say "I'm free." Yesterday the mortgage that has been on the property was satisfied and it is now free of all liens, Bob Coyne, of Hollywood, who purchased the property about a year ago, having cleared the property of all indebtedness.

Since taking over the property, Mr. Coyne has transformed the ranch from an almost barren waste into one of well-kept appearance. He has already sowed 250 acres to rye and next spring he is planning on seeding 700 additional acres. The ranch has been well stocked with horses, cattle and hogs and a number of large and small tractors have been employed in bringing the extensive acreage under cultivation. In addition the ranch house has been redecorated and refurnished, all buildings repaired, electric light plant installed and every modern convenience installed. There are 1200 acres in the property.

Throughout the country several of the most prominent scout troops are Indian boys and it is expected that the Agency boys will show splendid progress.

Boundary Line Trouble Over

LONDON, Dec. 4. (P)—An agreement reached by Great Britain, the Irish Free State, and Ulster on the troublesome boundary question provides that the old line between Ulster and the Free State shall remain intact.

The Free State will receive no additional territory. It will be allowed from paying a portion of Great Britain's war debts, but will assume the costs of compensation for damage to property in Ireland during the recent disturbances and increase the compensation ten percent.

The northern government obtains the transfer to the Ulster parliament of the powers heretofore invested in the council of Ireland.

The agreement is subject to ratification by the British parliament and the Dail Eireann. Just what reception it will receive in the Free State and in Ulster remains to be seen. Advice from Dublin say that the Free State ministers must satisfy the Dail that they have made the best possible bargain. The Dail has been adjourned until next Tuesday so that the question cannot come before it until then.

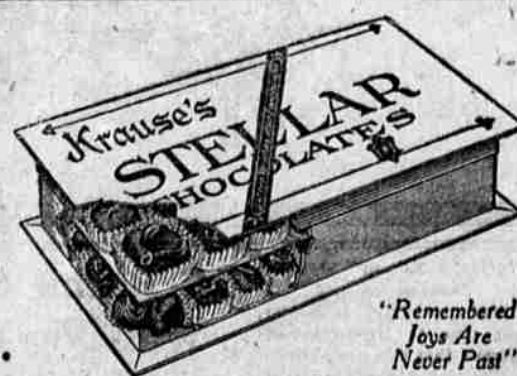
