

MAINTENANCE OF MARKET ROADS IS NEED OF COUNTY

J. H. Scott, State Market Road Engineer, Appears Before County Court

If market roads in Klamath are to be a success, there must be systematic and efficient maintenance and to the accomplishment of that end, the county court should devote a part of its road equipment for Klamath market roads.

To Klamath's county court, J. H. Scott, state market road engineer, carried this message. Mr. Scott is in Klamath for the purpose of investigating market road conditions and ascertaining what should be done toward maintaining the highways according to standard. Yesterday, accompanied by County Road Engineer Frank Z. Howard, Mr. Scott made a personal inspection of all market roads in Klamath county. His attention was drawn to the Chilquien-Williamson river road, which because of lack of maintenance has been rapidly disintegrating. Mr. Scott urged the court to trans-

fer some of its equipment to be used solely for market road purposes. He pointed out to the commissioners that no road could stand up unless served by systematic maintenance.

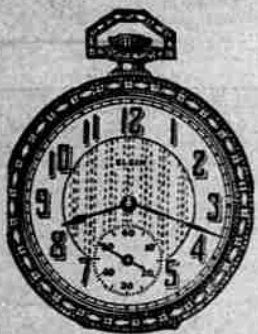

Galax Popular As Decoration For Christmas

T. L. Nelson, the well-known landscape engineer, opened the Christmas season today by presenting many of his friends with bunches of galax, a holiday garland or decoration that is gaining much vogue in the east. Galax is found only in Virginia, western North Carolina and parts of Tennessee. It is a fan-shaped leaf, about two and one-half inches at the base, and is found in two colors, a bright green and bronze. The leaf grows directly from the root, the stem being about five inches in length. It is gathered by the women of the mountain regions where it is found, who gather them into small bunches of twenty-six leaves each. For this work they are paid at the rate of 35 cents per thousand leaves. Many of them pick and tie into bunches as many as 10,000 leaves in a day. The galax is shipped to New York City and other eastern centers where it has become very popular for Christmas decorations, replacing mistletoe to a large extent.
