SIMNOSH, Ore., Dec. 4.—(AP)—Most of the 825 Indians on the Warm Springs reservation are gathered here today to pay tribute to their seventeen year old princess, Isabel Quahpama who is now listed on the reservation roster as Mrs. Tom Kee. The young couple were married on November 15, and the reception which begins this evening will end tomorrow afternoon with a big wedding feast given by the

mother of the bride. Tribal lines have been forgotten. Although the royal bride is a Warm Springs Indian, the daughter of the old Chief Henry Quahpama (grizzly bear) who died recently after a long and successful reign over his handful of followers the Plateau, Tenino and Wasco have entered into the spirit of the occasion and will participate in the feast and program of sports that will follow.

Special Film Will Be Shown at Church

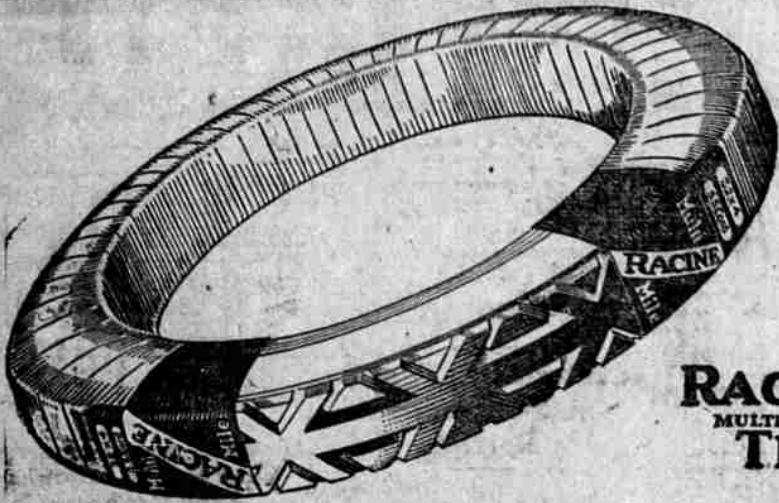

took him down to the police station. We looked at Pecholt's head and saw only a slight scratch so we thought he was all right. Our beliefs were confirmed when he walked from the car into the police station without assistance.

"We would not have placed Pecholt in jail, had we known that he was seriously hurt. We just thought he was drunk and that jail was all right for him. Some night watchman down in that section made the statement that one of us stood Pecholt on his head and took his money away from him. That is not true.

Fail to Report Accident
"I admit that McMills or one of us should have done something about the person that hit him. The accident should at least have been reported."

Cole left Klamath for good and all this noon. He was bound for some town in northern Oregon, where he will probably give up his official activities as special state agent.

Getting Steadily Worse
Pecholt was released from jail Sunday and wandered home in a semi-conscious condition. His condition has been getting steadily worse and it is frankly admitted that his chances for recovery are slight. He has been in a comatose condition and to questions from friends and his wife, he has only answered with inarticulate mumbling.

One of Pecholt's boarders, who declined to reveal his name, made the following statement:
"They say that he was struck by an automobile. It would seem to me that any man struck down by an automobile hard enough to fracture a skull, would have some sign of dirt or a tear on his clothes. Not so with Mr. Pecholt. When he came back home Sunday afternoon, his clothes were in the same condition as when he left, without a spot or a tear."

Pecholt, it was revealed, had drawn a check for \$200 Saturday afternoon and started out with the apparent purpose of purchasing liquor. For the several days preceding the accident, he had been drinking heavily, his friends said.

An effort to locate Special Agent McMills this afternoon, failed. According to Cole, McMills has the name and number of the car that is said to have struck down Pecholt.

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 5.—Allen MacLaren, Portland youth, is expected at the state penitentiary today to begin serving his four year term for a statutory crime committed in Clackamas county. Both his father, W. G. MacLaren, welfare and prison rescue worker of Portland, and former member of the state parole board, and the lad's mother, have made personal appeals to Governor Pierce to extend leniency to the youth, but the governor has been unyielding.
