P. Crown and George Petral of Portland arrived here last evening for a week's business visit.

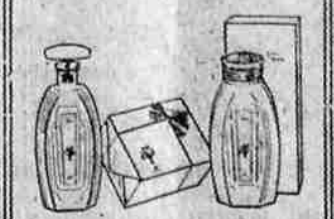
MISS ROBIN IMPROVES

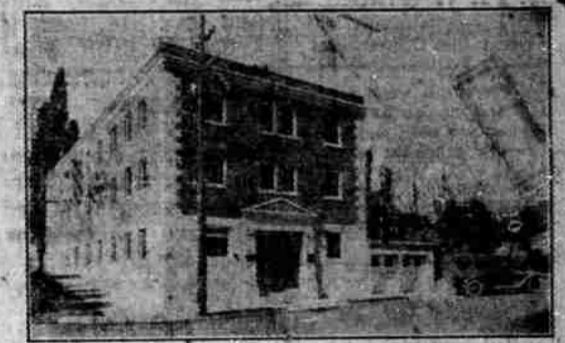
