Federal Aid Roads
A greater mileage of Federal-aid roads was completed during the fiscal year 1925 than in any previous year. The aggregate length of the projects completed was 11,329 miles, and the largest previous year's record was less than 10,000 miles.

The total cost of the projects completed during the year was approximately \$243,000,000, of which approximately \$111,000,000, or more than 45 per cent, was paid by the Federal Government.

This total Federal expenditure over the nine-year period has been large enough to make the Federal participation effective without necessitating extravagant expenditures of State funds to meet it.
