

Indian Pleads For Local Aid

Fred Hendricks Wants To Help Klamath Tribe

Fred Hendricks, a Modoc Indian holding tribal rights on the Klamath reservation, appeared before the chamber of commerce directors today noon and received their moral support in his campaign to raise

sufficient funds to go to Washington to press the demands of the Klamath Indians for a \$5,000,000 loan, to be repaid from the receipts of timber sales of Indian property.

Mr. Hendricks pointed out that the Indians, under the present plan of periodic payments of small sums, have no opportunity to better themselves and to make needed improvements on their farm lands. They want a government loan of sufficient size to give them a chance to farm their lands at a profit.

He spoke in sharp criticism of the red-tape of the bureau of Indian affairs, and of the delays which

were forced on the Indians by Dr. Hubert Work, secretary of the interior, and declared that if he should succeed in getting before congress he would press the claims of the Indians whether Secretary Work liked it or not.

The directors voted to recommend to the merchants' bureau that he be permitted to make solicitations in the stores of this city. He said it would take \$500 to finance the trip to congress.

SCOUTMASTERS WARNED

Scout Executive E. O. Nord Warns Scout Masters About Boys

In the weekly bulletin of scouting activities of the Crater Lake council, Scout Executive E. O. Nord, has warned all scoutmasters against allowing scouts to be used as Boy Scouts, in uniform or without, for any firm, business, rally, parade or stunt, without first getting permission of scout headquarters. Section one, article XVI, National by-laws, reads as follows: "No member, troop of scouts or officers, or representative of the Boy Scouts of America shall have the right to enter into relationship of a commercial character involving the Boy Scouts of America, unless duly authorized." The Boy Scout movement must not be used for commercial purposes. Any one asking you for use of the scouts, refer them to headquarters for permission.
