No Partisan Politics
The fruits of our labors are reflected in the coming tax reduction measure. It reflects the results of the efforts of the servants of the people and of their representatives in behalf of the people.

This brings us to the estimates of appropriations contained in this budget. These estimates reflect the continuing pressure for economy in federal expenditure. We have about reached the time when the legitimate business of government cannot be carried on at a less expenditure than that which it now requires.

To Aid Coast Guard
The president said he would send to congress later a request for funds to expand the coast guard as a part of his prohibition enforcement program.

Federal road aid was discussed by the executive and he reminded congress that any further expansion of the nation's commitments in that direction meant taking more money from the people through both federal and state taxes.

Mr. Coolidge adverted to the changed indications of receipts and expenditures which had been estimated for the current year and said that instead of refunds totaling \$90,000,000 on taxes illegally collected, present indications point to refunds of \$151,000,000.

COOLIDGE SAYS EXPENSES WILL

consideration of the bill by house and senate. Competition between the government and the airplane industry is not contemplated, Mr. Coolidge said.

Business Stimulant
Returning to the fiscal affairs of the government, the president expressed hope that further reduction in taxes now proposed would serve as a fresh stimulant to general business.

Outlook Favorable
"The outlook for 1926 and 1927 shows clearly that the united effort of the executive and legislative of the government for economy in federal expenditures is bearing further fruit.

"The outlook for the coming fiscal year, 1927, is most favorable," Mr. Coolidge continued. "For that year it is estimated that the ordinary receipts will be \$3,824,530,000 and expenditures \$3,494,222,000. This indicates a surplus of \$330,307,000.

"The ways and means committee of the house of representatives has been informed of our prospective surplus for 1927. That committee has prepared a tax reduction measure.
