

Start To Ship Holiday Turks

ROSEBURG, Ore., Dec. 10.—The shipment of Christmas turkeys has already been started in the county, and indications are that there will be a large quantity of birds purchased before Turkey day which has been set for the 18th. Competition on the market, together with the possibility of a break in the retail price is said to be stimulating buyers to contract ahead of time to fill orders and to ship the birds by freight to secure a lower rate than in the case of fast express.

Several thousand birds in the vicinity of Oakland have been con-

tracted, it is said, and shipments have already been made from Yoncalla. One shipment the first of the week was consigned to Alaska. Prices so far have been 45 cents with an 8 cent drop on number 2 stock, little variation from that price had been reported and it is the general belief that the Christmas market will center around a 45 cent price.

Owing to the fact that practically all growers hold back their birds at Thanksgiving time, there will be an average number of turkeys offered on the Christmas market. Douglas county will probably have five carloads for shipment, according to present estimates.

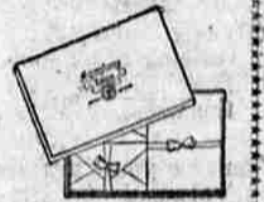
