Rudderless Ship Is Being Towed

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 10.—(AP)—The steamer West Holbrook reached the rudderless West O'Rowa at 2 a. m. today and officers of the Columbia Shipping Company, operator of the vessels, assumed that the West Holbrook and the Dewey were today engaged in towing the West O'Rowa. The disabled craft has been adrift on the Pacific ocean about 2200 miles west of Portland for several days.

Harrisburg Bridge To Be Open Today

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 10.—State highway engineer Roy Klein announces that the new \$200,000 bridge over the Willamette river at Harrisburg will be opened to traffic today. The bridge is the last Willamette river bridge unit on the Pacific highway and will take the place of the Harrisburg ferry that has been in use for years. Construction of the bridge has been under way for the last 18

months. The bridge has three 130 foot spans, making the total length 390 feet, but with the addition of approach construction the length stretches out to 1600 feet. The bridge is of concrete and steel. The new bridge is expected to increase traffic over the east side route of the Pacific highway.
