WALTER BOWNE AWARDED PRIZE

Bonanza Boy Winner of Sugar Beet Honor; Gets \$100

Walter Bowne, Bonanza, was the winner of the first prize in the sugar beet growing contest for boys and girls of Klamath county clubs, and gets the \$100.00 cash prize offered by Dr. Fred Westerfield of Klamath Falls. Louis Hill, Merrill, was second prize winner and receives for his efforts the \$25 cash prize offered by J. L. Sparretorn of Bonanza.

The first prize winner produced 15.16 tons beets per acre with a sugar content of 17.8 per cent, giving 5411.8 pounds sugar per acre. The second prize winner produced 13.9 tons beets per acre with a sugar content of 15 per cent, giving 4225.6 pounds sugar per acre.

Francis Bowne, Bonanza, was third, producing 11.2 tons beets per acre with a sugar content of 18.1 per cent, giving 4081.76 pounds sugar per acre. Others deserving special mention were Jane Bowne, Bonanza; Lester Moore, Merrill; Irwin Campbell, Klamath Falls; Claude and Clifford Chuck, Merrill; and George Burnett, Midland. All of these ranging high in a field of twenty-one entrants. Sugar content in some of the beets reached better than 20 per cent.

Complete record was kept of the growing crop by all the winning contestants from the time of planting until harvest.

BACTERIA TEST OF MILK WILL BE MADE HERE SOON

Dairymen Feel that Move Will Insure Better Milk and Gain More Support

Bacterial tests of milk distributed in Klamath Falls will be made as soon as possible, it was decided yesterday afternoon at a meeting of Klamath dairymen held in the city hall. The meeting was called by Dr. E. D. Lamb, deputy state dairy and food commissioner.

That tests would not only insure pure milk to every Klamath Falls

consumer but would also increase the confidence in Klamath dairymen was the belief of dairymen present at the meeting. And for these two reasons it was believed that bacterial tests should at least be given a trial.

Four dairymen, O. P. Couchman, Glen Kent of the Klamath Falls Creamery, Mr. Klatt of the Lost River Dairy and C. L. Holliday of the Holliday Dairy personally guaranteed that if there were any Klamath dairymen who refused to meet the \$2.50 charge for a bacterial test, that they would pay the test charge.

Dr. Lamb urged that a dairymen's association be formed, in order that mutual troubles could be ironed out through the medium of an

organization. But the dairymen present did not appear to enthuse over the idea.

Jacobs Released Under \$500 Bond

William Jacobs, supposed proprietor of the notorious Three Mile house on the Ashland highway, was released this morning under \$500 bond. His case will come before Justice of the Peace Emmitt the fore part of next week.

Jacobs was taken in custody last evening by State Prohibition L. L. McBride with two quarts of alleged gin in his possession. He declined to enter a plea this morning and his

request that the case be continued until next week was granted.
