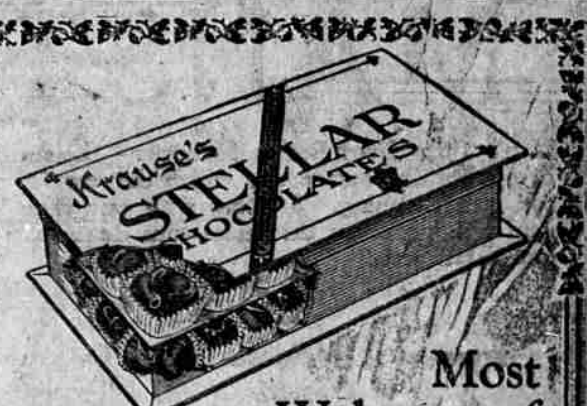
TO ATTEND MEETING
