To Ask Referendum on Boundary Award

DUBLIN, Dec. 11. (AP)—The Irish republicans, whose representatives in the Dail Eireann signed a declaration last night, declaring unalterable opposition to the partitioning of Ireland, now are contemplating the possibility of securing a referendum on the London boundary agreement.

It is believed, however, that because of their numerical minority in the dail and the senate, they will be unable to fulfill the necessary preliminary conditions.

Before a referendum is possible there must be a demand by two fifths of the members of the Dail or a majority of the senate.

LOCAL TIRE MAN OUTWITS INDIAN

Alleged Forger Taken in Custody at Klamath Tire Shop Yesterday

The new tires were on the car. It was after 3 o'clock and the bank was closed when B. Butler, Indian of Chiloquin, offered H. E. Calkins a check for \$155 in payment for the tires.

Calkins became suspicious of the check, partly because Butler had come into his establishment, the Klamath Tire Shop, earlier in the day but had showed no disposition to buy tires until after 3 p. m., when the bank closed.

So Calkins sent his aide, Henry Burke, over to the First National Bank with the check and it was found there that it was a forgery on the name of F. F. McCredie of Chiloquin. The bank called the

sheriff's office and in a trice Butler was on his way to jail. A search of his effects revealed another check, with the false signature of F. F. McCredie of Chiloquin inscribed. Butler waived preliminary examination in justice court and was bound over to the Klamath county grand jury.

Cost of Shines to Mount in Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 11. (AP)—The price of a shoe shine here will return tomorrow to the war time level 15c. If the Portland Shoe Shine Shop owners association, organized last night, succeeds in carrying out its plans. The price for several years has been 10 cents.
