MEMORIAL FOR TRAIL BLAZERS WILL BE BUILT

ASTORIA, Ore., Dec. 11.—(P)—Plans for a memorial to John Jacob Astor, founder of Astoria, Captain Robert Gray, discoverer of Columbia river and the Lewis and Clark expedition, to be built by the Great Northern railway and Vincent Astor, were accepted here today by the park commission.

The monument will stand 120 feet high and will cost in the neighborhood of \$100,000 according to Ralph Budd, president of the Great Northern who arrived here this morning in his special car.

The monument will be erected on Coxeomb hill, in the center of John Jacob Astor memorial park. The hill is 660 feet above tide water. It will be designed and built by Elecius G. Litchfield, sculptor of New York. Reinforced concrete will form the body of the memorial.
