Ernie Nevers Will Become Professional

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 12. (AP)—Another nationally known football star in the person of Ernie Nevers of Stanford University, has left the amateur field to join the ranks of professionals, says the San Francisco Examiner, today.

The newspaper says the champion and fullback of the 1925 cardinal football team has signed a contract to captain an all-star Jacksonville, Fla., aggregation and will receive a consideration in excess of \$50,000.

The contract was closed by telegraph last night with a group of Jacksonville capitalists, who have arranged a schedule that will bring together Nevers, who is the candidate for all start Pacific fullback, Red Grange of the Chicago Bears.

Nevers' entrance into professional football, he declared, was to enable him to repay his parents who sent him to college.

NEW TAX LEVY FOR STATE IS SET BY BOARD

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 12.—The state tax commission late yesterday promulgated the state tax levy for 1926, announcing it at \$7,200,830.79. This is \$281,930.68 less than the levy of a year ago, and includes both millage levies to which the six per cent limitation does not apply and the amount to be raised within that limitation. The decrease is accounted for by the fact that the 1925 legislature reduced the millage levy in the soldier bonus law from a mill to half a mill, so that only \$542,368 will be levied for that purpose next year instead of over a million. The total to be levied to which the 6 per cent limitation does not apply is \$5,142,359.07.

The amount to be levied within the 6 per cent limitation is \$2,058,471.72, which is an increase of \$115,382.93 over last year when the amount was \$1,923,048.79. In mills the comparison is 1.93 made a year ago for 1925 to a fraction over 2 mills for the coming year.

It was the low levy a year ago that brought upon Governor Pierce much criticism in the legislature and subsequently, charges that he and former State Treasurer Jefferson Myers arbitrarily cut the levy in retaliation for the repeal of the state income tax. Regardless of whether these charges were justified, the legislature made necessary appropriations in excess of what can be levied under the 6 per cent limitation, and this, in the new tax levy, is calculated as a deficit of \$480,863.25 that the state must face the coming year. Governor Pierce does not agree that such a deficit is certain and will issue a special statement regarding it.

The estimated deficit was arrived at as follows: The amount required for the expenses of the state government for 1924 and 1926 and payment of special claims was \$9,378,085.65. The amount of expenses estimated for the year ending December 31, 1925, is \$4,757,154.73, leaving \$4,618,930.92 to which the state will be subject for 1926 and the payment of specified claims for which appropriations were made but not levied. From this amount is deducted \$2,099,635.95, which is the

estimated receipts for 1926 from various sources, mainly fees to be met by direct levy. But since this is \$480,863.26 in excess of what can be levied under the 6 per cent limitation, the latter amount is calculated as a probable deficit.

A picture of undoubted importance to the motion picture contributions is "Sun-Up" which comes to the Pine Tree theatre on Sunday.

Delaney Loses To Berlenbach

NEW YORK, Dec. 12. (AP)—The world's light heavy weight ring championship crown still rests on the head of Paul Berlenbach after a fiercely contested 15 round battle last night with the man who knocked him out in four rounds less than two years ago.

Jack Delaney, of Bridgeport, Conn., was several times within reach of another sensational triumph over the Astoria, N. Y., title holder before the 23,000 spectators in the now Madison Square Garden. But at the points when an aggressive offensive would seemingly have swept the champion to decisive defeat, Delaney hesitated, and waited to his sorrow.

Floored for a count of three in the fourth and punched groggy in the sixth and seventh, Berlenbach closed in the last six rounds with a stirring rally which saved for him the title he wrested from Mike McTigue.

His margin of victory was close, for newspaper men at the ringside gave him only seven rounds to six for the challenger while two were even.

Berlenbach proved that he has become a new and vastly improved fighter since his stunning defeat by Delaney in their first meeting. But the outstanding factor in his success was indomitable courage in the face of almost certain defeat—courage which bore him up under a gruelling exchange and which enabled him to even the score of knockdowns by dropping Delaney in the twelfth.

Delaney was reeling under punches in the thirteenth and fourteenth but stuck to his task gamely and finished fighting back strongly.
