Oregon State Health Board Vetoes Closure

Claims Rigid Quarantine and Active Supervision Effective

In the face of the expressed opinion of 12 out of 15 doctors in Klamath Falls, that virtual quarantine should be put into effect in the city as long as the epidemic of spinal meningitis is prevalent, the state board of health wired to Dr. G. S. Newcom, medical director of the Klamath County health unit, yesterday afternoon that such a move was unnecessary. Dr. Stricker, secretary of the state board expressed the opinion that rigid quarantine of meningitis cases and active supervision of schools would do more to control the disease than a closed town.

The council did not adopt the resolution. Nor was it even considered, it merely authorized the city attorney to draw up an ordinance on the street vacation issue, which would be considered at the next meeting.

The Lorenz Plumbing company submitted an "it" proposition to the council. "If" the council grants them vacation of certain city streets then the plumbing concern will enclose the sawdust pile of the heating plant behind a 20 foot fence. An adequate sprinkling system would be installed, which it was claimed would eliminate the nuisance of flying saw dust, if the street vacations were allowed.
