About 4140 operators are under the jurisdiction of the commission.

PAVING OF MAIN STREET TO COST FORTY THOUSAND

Authorities Believe Property Holders Will Take Rock Base

If Main street property owners want the best paving available, they must dig down in their pockets and pull out the sum of \$40,000. For this is the estimate today of Assistant City Engineer Henry on how much the paving will cost.

It is not business Main street that is seeking the paving. It is Main street from the Spring street intersection east to the government canal bridge, declared to be one of the worst streets at the present time in Klamath Falls.

At first property holders petitioned for macadam. The council set its foot down hard against macadam and is now insisting on pavement.

Macadamizing would cost about \$23,000. It is believed that a compromise will be effected whereby bitulithic will be used, but instead of a black base, a rock base will be used. This would cost \$25,000 and it is believed the assessed valuation of the property affected could carry the project through at this figure.

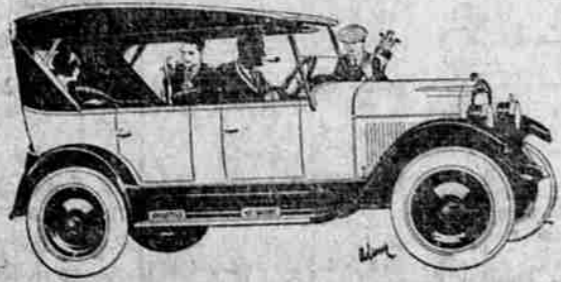

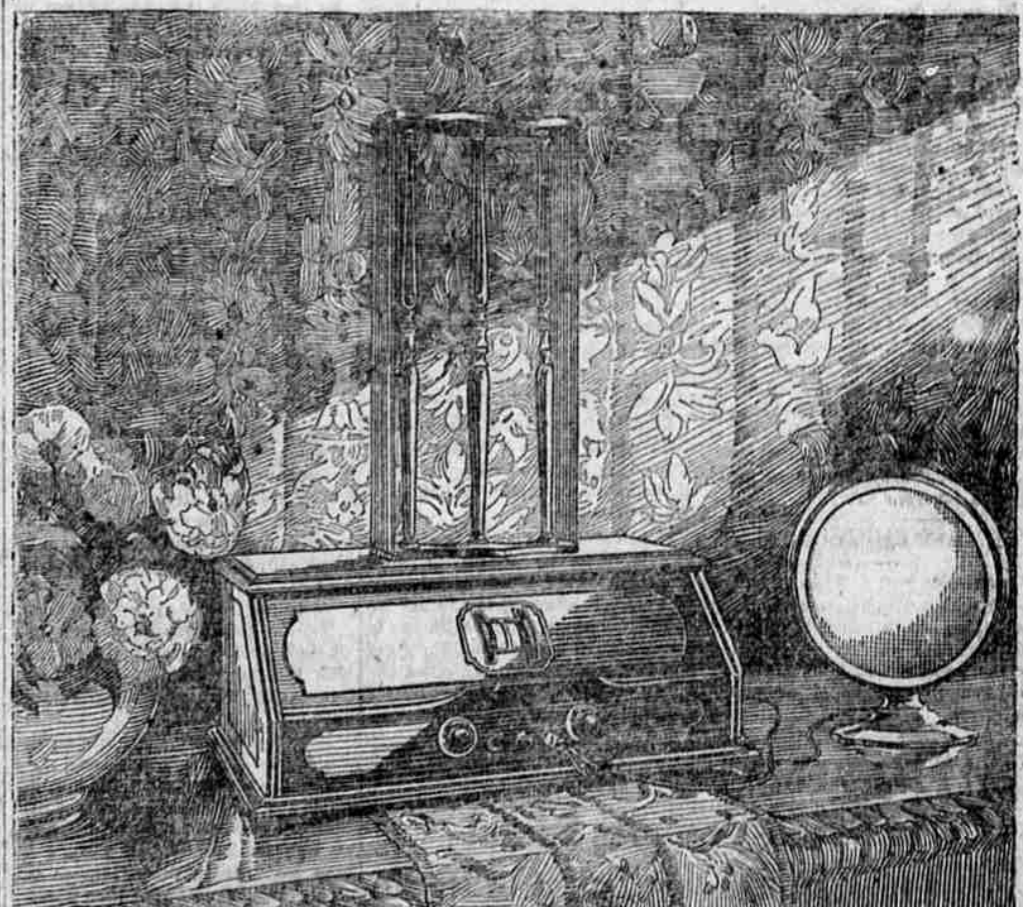
