(AP)—A rich Christmas present for stockholders of the American Can company was announced today when directors authorized a \$3 extra dividend on the common shares and proposed a 50 percent stock dividend with an exchange of six new shares for one of the old when the present par value of the stock has been reduced from \$100 to \$35.

\$100,000 Loss In Campus Fire At Corvallis

Historic Building Gutted at Oregon Agricultural College

CORVALLIS, Ore., Dec. 17.—(AP)—Fire, starting from a gas explosion, partially gutted Science Hall, historic building on the campus of Oregon Agricultural College, yesterday afternoon, causing damage estimated at nearly \$100,000.

Walter Barkus, a fireman, sustained injuries to his eyes when struck by flying chemicals.

Only a few students were in the building when the explosion occurred and they escaped without injury as the chemical stock room on the ground floor burst into flames. Students in the pharmacy building nearby turned in an alarm and put the fire hose from that building into play until the city fire department arrived.

A few minutes later another explosion rocked the building, further spreading the flames.

Firemen succeeded in extinguishing the flames about an hour later. Class work for the term was over and examinations were being held. President W. J. Kerr announced that he planned to have repair work started immediately. The greatest damage was done to the valuable chemicals and equipment kept in the building, although rooms and offices in the center of the four story structure were gutted to the third floor.

Autoists Urged to Prepare for Cold

Prepare the car now against the coming of cold weather and be protected against any sudden drops in temperature, is the text of the warning broadcast by the Ford Motor company to Ford car owners in cold climates.

To eliminate as far as possible the annoyances of winter driving, the service department of the company has outlined a set of simple precautions against freezing.

They are in brief: Add anti-freeze solution to radiator.

Be discreet in use of choke. Conserve battery current.

Drivers are cautioned against patent solutions for radiators of unknown formula. The safest to use is denatured or wood alcohol.

The amount of alcohol necessary to prevent freezing is also given in a table which includes all winter temperatures.

Freezing point 13 above zero, 20% alcohol, 30% water, specific gravity .974; 3 degrees above zero, 30% alcohol, 70% water, spec. gravity .964; 20 below zero, 40% alcohol, 60% water, spec. grav. .953; 34 below zero, 50% alcohol, 50% water, spec. gravity .936.

Evaporation of the alcohol after the engine is warmed up may be considerable retarded by the addition of a small amount of glycerine, equal to about 10% of the total capacity of the radiator.

Present day gasoline does not vaporize readily in cold weather, starting necessitates use of the choke. Discretion should be used, however, because of the fact that the raw fuel sucked into the combustion chamber condenses and passes the piston rings into the crankcase, making for oil dilution. Protect radiator with blanket or cover to minimize delay in the "warming up."

Care must be exercised to see that the battery is not discharged by long periods of cranking the engine. If the battery is allowed to stand idle in a discharged condition it will freeze.

tion from that grade is not made by seniority.

"What punishment would be, under the custom of our service, be meted out to a soldier with only a sixth grade education who has committed the offense of which the accused has been proven guilty? Confinement at hard labor most certainly. How then can this unrepentant accused with all his advantages of education and position be let off with less than dismissal?"

Major Gullion admitted that it was not known "just how seriously the accused's conduct has been actually prejudicing discipline" and told the court "it need not be known" to enable it to reach a finding.

"Our soldiers are watching this case," he said, "fall to dismiss him and you weaken the authority of every non-commissioned officer in the service. Dismiss him as he deserves and you strengthen the arm of every single officer commanding a one company post from Marfa to Nogales."
