Reports were to the effect that A. M. Dairyple, recently deposed as warden of the penitentiary, was stated to be named by the governor as superintendent of the auxiliary prison.

Britain to Get Away with Steal of Turkish Oil

LONDON, Dec. 18.—(AP)—A most hopeful view taken here regarding the situation growing out of the endorsement by the league of nations of Great Britain's position respecting the Mosul boundary in the kingdom of Iraq, is that opportunity now is to be given negotiators to attempt to arrange a friendly understanding between Turkey and Great Britain. Armed hostilities between Germany and Great Britain over the latter having secured mandate for rich oil and agricultural regions are not considered probable either in London or in league of nations circles.

WHITEWASH COAT GIVEN BRAMWELL, STATE BANK HEAD

Coercion Charge Unfounded Decision of State Banking Board at Salem

BY UNANIMOUS VOTE

Letter to Wavering Bank Introduced as Evidence; Quiz Portland Man

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 18.—The state banking board late yesterday cleared Frank C. Bramwell, state bank superintendent, of inferred charges brought by Portland National bank officials, that he had been arbitrary and coercive in his efforts to reorganize a certain western Oregon bank that was on the verge of collapse. On the question of whether a charter will be issued by Bramwell to the Portland National bank to serve as a reserve depository for state banks no decision has yet been reached. Bramwell said that he would act on the application as soon as it is completed. Should his ruling be unfavorable and the bank wish to appeal to the board, the latter manifested a willingness to take up the case without delay.

Bramwell was cleared relative to his business dealings with the unidentified bank when the board unanimously adopted a resolution prepared by State Treasurer Kay.

The incident that brought Bramwell under fire was a letter signed by himself as superintendent of banks, proposing that the wavering bank be revived by placing a member of his department in charge with a 12 months option to buy the bank, his salary to be \$250 a month and the bank stock to be placed in escrow with the state bank superintendent.
