## THOROUGHBREDS PURCHASED BY LOCAL STOCKMEN

### Bell, Reeder and Vollman Ranches Acquire Prize-Winning Jerseys

Klamath now has a gold medal purebred cow, said to be the only gold medal cow in southern Oregon. It is now the property of Harry Bell who operates a ranch in the Chelsea district. Mr. Bell purchased the medal cow, who goes by the name of St. Mawes' Retta, from the famous Noah Black herd of Reedsport, at an auction sale held in Medford Saturday afternoon.

The medal cow is a Jersey, as were all the cows sold by Mr. Black, at the auction sale. The animal received the gold medal by virtue of establishing a record of 706.67 lbs. of butter fat in one year. The honor was awarded by the National Jersey association. At the time the record was hung up, the cow was six years old.

Bell also purchased the daughter of the medal cow, Zamalea Retta, considered to be the highest type of Jersey displayed at the auction sale. The cow is but four years old, and it is believed by prominent dairymen, that she will exceed the high record of butter fat production made by her mother.

U. E. Reeder, prominent farmer of the Henley district purchased two exceptional cows at the auction sale: one, Princess St. Mawes' Gerlie, which under normal conditions, produced 45 pounds of milk a day, according to an unofficial test; the second, Retta St. Mawes' Princess, two and a half years, and representing the finest type of Jersey cow extant.

Mrs. A. J. Vollman of Rocky Point purchased a fine Jersey cow from the famous herd, Bruce's Mamie, which she will receive next spring. Authorities on livestock state that the purebred livestock in Klamath will enhance the standard of Klamath dairies and will be the cornerstone of a widespread and prosperous dairy industry in this county.

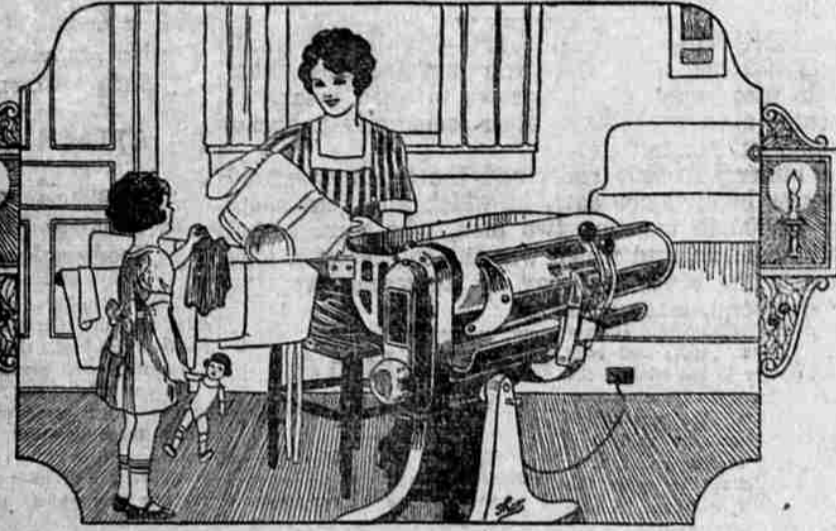

## BRITAIN WORRIED BY TURKISH VIEW OF MOSUL AFFAIR

### May Lead to War, Belief of Prominent English Statesman

LONDON, Dec. 21. —(AP)—Mosul, the administration of which is costing Great Britain \$20,000,000 yearly, still remains a burning question in England. Former Under Secretary for foreign affairs Harmsworth is of the opinion that it would be madness for Great Britain to take upon her shoulders for 25 years the Mosul mandate or the risk of passive or active antagonism between Great Britain "and a formidable power" when any moment might bring an incident with the menace of war.

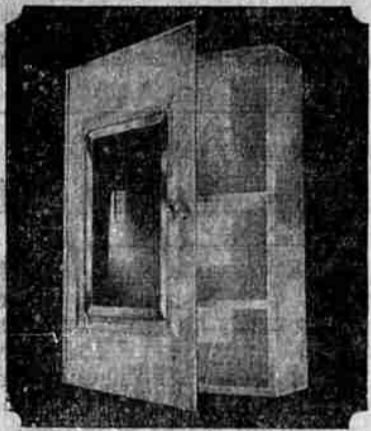
Harmsworth was in the foreign office at the time the mandates for Mesopotamia and Palestine were created. He urges the British government to retreat from what he terms its dangerous "position." "In my considered judgment," he said, "the arrangements just concluded (the giving of the mandate to Great Britain by the council of the league of nations) open up the most dangerous prospect that has confronted this country since the great war."

Mr. Harmsworth argues that a friendly working agreement between Great Britain and Turkey would be valuable. In depreciating the idea that Turkey in her stand may be bluffing, he recalls how often such an idea has led to war and appeals to the government to return to its policy of quitting Mesopotamia as was originally intended in 1923.
