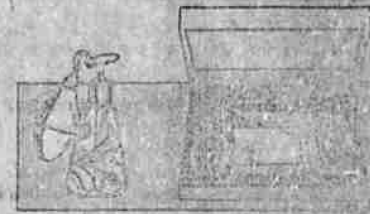
C. A. HENDERSON
