A young wife was called by death yesterday morning. She was Mrs. Kathleen Sullivan, wife of Dan C. Sullivan, prominent sheep operator of Klamath and Lake counties.

Mrs. Sullivan was but 20 years of age and had become a mother just two weeks before her untimely end. Her death was caused from complications following an operation for appendicitis. She had been seriously ill just a few days.

Mrs. Sullivan resided in Klamath Falls for the past two months. Prior to that time she and her husband lived in Lakeview. She is a native of Williamstown, Ireland, but has been in the United States for many years.

Funeral services will be held tomorrow morning at 8:30 o'clock in Sacred Heart church. A requiem Mass will be offered by the Rev. Father A. L. Loeser. Tonight the members of the Altar Society of the Catholic church will recite the Rosary in honor of Mrs. Sullivan, in Whitlock's funeral home.

Besides her husband, Mrs. Sullivan is survived by her infant child, aged two weeks. Nothing was known of the names of her parents.

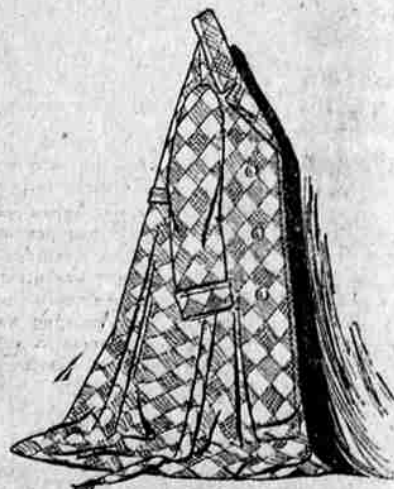

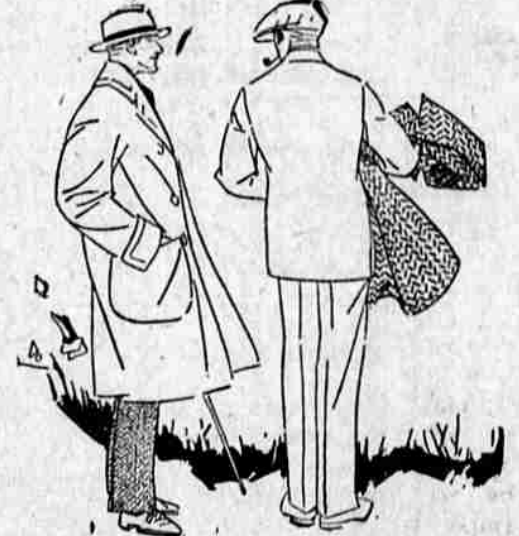
