Jazz May Be Grand Opera Of The Future

Originators, However, Don't Want It Yet

NEW YORK, Dec. 22.—(AP)—The suggestion by Aruro Rodanaki, Vienna conductor of the Metropolitan Opera company, that jazz may yet find a place as a dance form in grand opera, has stirred creators of jazz.

They insist that at least for the present jazz wants no place in the metropolitan. They even declare that such a place would be fatal to jazz. "The best way to ruin jazz is to dress it up in an opera cape and put it on the diamond horseshoe of the metropolitan," says Ted Lewis, exponent of true jazz. The other jazzists agree heartily with Mr. Lewis. They think jazz justifies itself as characteristic in America, and a highly developed musical form as it stands. Twelve years ago Irving Berlin

determined to write a rag time opera but since that time he has changed his mind. "I don't believe now that any man ever will conscientiously write a jazz opera," he said. "I do believe, however, that some day a great composition will be written in jazz tempo."

"When that happens we will have a true American opera. If American composer writes the opera in the standard foreign forms it will not be an American opera. An American opera will have to be in jazz tempo, for jazz tempo is the only true American musical expression."

Dempsey Signs New Contract For Fall Fight

Bout May Be Staged In Eastern City

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 22.—(AP)—Jack Dempsey, champion heavyweight fighter, and Floyd Fitzsimmons, promoter of the Dempsey-Wills title match, has agreed to new terms for a bout next fall. Fitzsimmons will pay a substantial amount "on account" and the champion will post a large bond to insure his appearance in the ring.

The new articles of agreement are to take place of those signed last summer, under which a South Bend syndicate was to back Fitzsimmons in staging the fight at Michigan City, Ind.

Under the new agreement the champion is said to have the same guarantee as promised him for the fight at Michigan City. The bout, according to the latest plans, may be staged in Michigan City or any other town of several states where conditions and boxing regulations are favorable.
