MONEY QUARREL HAS FATAL END

Longview Negress Is Slain By Sweetheart During Altercation

LONGVIEW, Wash., Dec. 23.—(P)—Minnie Scott, 30, negro woman, was shot and instantly killed here shortly before noon today by Al Williams, 30 year old negro, following a quarrel over money matters, police reported.

Williams was arrested a few minutes after the shooting and police said he confessed the crime.

Williams and Miss Scott, who was his sweetheart, were walking in company with Miss Scott's sister, Mrs. Louise Kelly, when Williams whirled Miss Scott around and fired two shots from an automatic pistol into her back. He cowed her sister into silence and then proceeded up town. Williams is held in jail here.
