2 tablespoons shortening
1/2 cup milk or equal parts of milk and water
Mix and sift dry ingredients; work in shortening with knife or finger tips. Gradually add liquid, mixing with a knife to a soft dough. Turn on a floured board, pat or roll lightly to one-half inch thickness, cut with biscuit cutter, place in pan, brush over tops with melted shortening or milk. Scones
