

### Munn Decides To Quit Ring

#### Knockout in The First Round Enough For Him

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Dec. 24.—(P)—Nursing a battered chin, Wayne (Big) Munn today had given up dreams of a career in the prize ring. Munn concluded that the equipment necessary to success in the wrestling game avails nothing in boxing, shortly after he stepped inside the ropes here last night with Andre Anderson, heavyweight boxer of Chicago. Gloves thudded on Munn's chin

and two minutes after the opening of the first round he was counted out. It was his third and final appearance in the role of a boxer. "I guess I wasn't cut out for boxing," Munn said, after the bout. "I'll stick to wrestling hereafter." Munn's third attempt to turn his brawn to account in boxing was no more disastrous than his first, for he was knocked out twice at Sioux City, Iowa, after leaving the University of Nebraska, where he played football.

### POPE PIUS HAS BIG CEREMONY

#### Closing of Holy Door Attended by Thousands of Catholic Pilgrims

ROME, Dec. 24.—(P)—Pope Pius XI, picturesquely clad in robes of rich medieval design and surrounded by ecclesiastical dignitaries, today performed the ceremony of closing the holy door of the Basilica of St. Peter, the mammoth mother church of catholicism. The ceremony officially brought to a close the year of penitence and pardon specifically marked on the Catholic calendar once every quarter of a century.

The holy door had remained open since a year ago today, when the pope was the central figure in a similar opening ceremony. Since that time more than 3,000,000 Catholic pilgrims from every corner of the world had crossed the sill and kissed the door posts of that sacred aperture as a sign of devotion and humility. Most of them likewise kissed the celebrated fisherman's ring on the right hand of the supreme spiritual leader and received medals commemorative of the holy year from the pontiff's own hands.

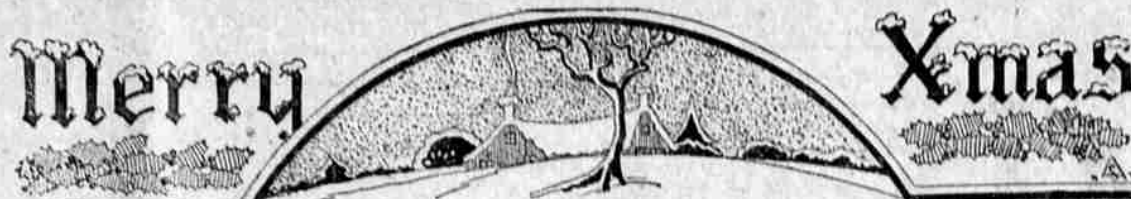
Cardinal Hayes of New York was a prominent figure among the cardinals at the ceremony, while the group of bishops in the procession included Bishop Lillies of Kansas City, Bishop Hoban of Scranton, Bishop Drumm of Des Moines, and Bishop Lawter of Lead, S. D.

Several thousands of pilgrims, together with multitudes of Romans, men occupying high position of state and members of the historic Roman aristocracy who filled the great Basilica today to bear witness to the time honored ceremony.

### FORMER BANKER QUESTIONED IN PORTLAND PROBE

#### Verbal Fireworks Flare up in Inquiry Over Kinks Food Company

#### HAS FAULTY MEMORY S. L. Eddy Cannot Remember Actions of Board of Directors

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 24. (P)—S. L. Eddy, formerly a vice president of the Ladd and Tilton bank, was questioned at length last night regarding stock deals and other business affairs connected with the old Kinks Food Products company. To a majority of questions asked, Eddy replied that he could not remember. The hearing was before Circuit Judge Morrow and was called to get Eddy's disposition for use in the trial of Agnes Boyd Wigle against Ladd and Tilton bank

and others, the former vice president being one of the defendants.

The questions were put by John T. Reilly, who with L. E. Crouch, is attorney for the plaintiff. An array of counsel appeared for the defendant, A. A. Hampson, R. A. Montague, Dan J. Malarkey, John P. Winter and Prescott Cookingham. A larger part of the three and a half hour hearing was taken up with arguments by attorneys.

#### Can't Remember

Eddy could not recall how he happened to have been made a director of the Kinks Food Products company, nor did he know whether any one in the bank suggested that he be made a director. He did know that the company owed the bank considerable sums and that it was desirable of having someone represent the bank sitting on the board of directors.

"Do you remember ever sitting at any of the meetings of the Salem Kings Products company?" asked Reilly.

"I cannot answer unless I refresh my memory with the records." "Then I will ask you to refresh your memory," continued Reilly.

"I don't know where the records are," said Eddy. "You had better get them or we will have to bring them into court," the lawyer replied.

#### Attorney Interrupts

This led to the first display of verbal fireworks. Malarkey arose quickly and began a lengthy talk with declaration: "You had better get them, you can't order this witness to go out and hunt up anything for you."

Judge Morrow ruled that Eddy did not have to hunt up evidence for Reilly. The plaintiff's attorney then inquired:

"Can you recall the deal whereby the Kings Food Products company surrendered its patent rights without consideration to the Pacific Evaporation company, which transferred them to F. N. Clark and he sold them back on the same day to the Kings Food Products company for \$750,000 in stock?"

"I'll not answer in detail unless I have the records on the matter," replied Eddy.

#### Court Ruling

Judge Morrow ruled that the witness must answer all he could recall of the transaction, although the

court said no one had to power to make the witness remember.

At 11 p. m. the judge adjourned the hearing to next Wednesday.
