is doubtful if there will be any
dressed birds carried over.
A clean-up of other lines of fancy
dressed poultry, including ducks,
geese and chickens was also made.
Egg values eased off again in
the fresh market. On the dairy
exchange fresh mediums are two
cents lower at 28c and all other
grades are down one cent with ex-
tras posted at 35 cents.
Extra cubes are a cent lower in
the local butter market at 46 1/2c.
All other grades are steady and un-
changed. The butter market is
showing a weak undertone.
