ORIGIN OF FISH WILL BE FOUND

NEW YORK, Dec. 26.—(AP)—A fossilized fish scale, larger than a match head, discovered at St. Albans, Vermont, is forcing scientists to extend estimates of pre-human life backwards millions of years, the New York Times says today.

"Howell's Dawn Fish" is the name that has been given to this denizen of the cambrian age which it had heretofore been supposed was peopled only by invertebrates and plants of low order. Although there is no information on which to base a description of this "fish plate" as it is called, scientists say it is highly important because it proves that Choro chordate—or primitive vertebrate—existed in what had been considered a "backboneless age" 50,000,000 to 100,000,000 years ago at the dawn of life in its lowest forms.

Professor B. F. Howell of the department of geology at Princeton university, the discoverer of the plate, said that it corresponded to the scale of the present species of fish. It was described as being part of the armor which probably defended the head and foretrunk of some hitherto unknown fish. It is said it may throw light on the origin of the fish as a genus.

The plate is now in the Princeton museum of paleontology. Professor Howell and Professor Charles Schuchert of the department of geology at Yale found it last summer on the final day of a field expedition which was one of a series extended over 13 years by Professor Howell to find chordata in cambrian strata.

The fossil was found in shale that contained trilobites and brachiopods which enabled scientists to estimate the age of the strata, and indicated that fish might have had their origin in salt water instead of fresh, as had been believed.

Frank Farmer Will Get Here Tomorrow To Train For His Battle With Willie Keeler

Public Workouts to be Held at Scandia Hall Tomorrow Afternoon—One Round Hogan Gains Most of Friends—Real Card Is Lined Up

Foxy old Frank Farmer, Puget Sound logger, packed his "cork" boots and fighting trunks in the carpetbag this morning and boarded the rattlers at Tacoma and headed for Klamath Falls, where he will swap jabs and uppercuts with Willie Keeler of Kellogg, Idaho, at Scandia hall here next Friday night.

Although he originally planned to reach here Thursday, Farmer decided to take no chances. He remembers the 15-round lacing Willie gave him a few months ago in Idaho, and he also remembers that the Portland Boxing commission wants him there in a couple of weeks or so to meet Nig Yeager in a return bout. So he'll be here tomorrow in order to get in the best possible condition for Mister Keeler. If Keeler rocks him into the land of nod the chances are that the Portland commission will call off the Yeager bout.

Advance dope indicates that Farmer should win over the 10-round decision. Keeler's youth and 20-pound weight advantage told on Farmer in the closing rounds.

But the 10-round game is what Farmer likes. He can go at top speed in these 30-minute slugfests, and with a week to get into condition here, he figures to give Keeler a battle that he'll remember for a long time.

Most of the Klamath fans have seen Farmer fight. They know him to be one of the best heavyweights on the Pacific coast, so they'll welcome his return to Klamath against a boy who can stand toe to toe and trade socks with him until somebody or something drops.

Farmer is scheduled to arrive here at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon, and all fans, including women, are invited to attend the public workout.

If "One Round" Hogan scores his expected knockout over Jim Fleming in their six-round semi-windup, the people of Mallin probably will hold a big reception to celebrate the victory of their favorite son. Hogan, whose real name belongs to Mallin's "Who's Who," is one of the fastest kids ever developed in this neck of the pine woods, and already he is a prima favorite with Klamath boxing fans. But Fleming is not without his host of supporters, and those who were lucky enough to be there when these boys battled four terrific rounds a week ago will be close to the ring when the referee brings them to the center of the ring for their six rounds of fistie explosives.

Anti-German Sentiment Is Rousing Italy

ROME, Dec. 26. (AP)—Anti-German sentiment is flaring up in Italy. Denouncing Germany as "our instinctive racial enemy" the Fascist paper "Impero" has come out with a warning to Italians against the trade and other activities of Germany.

The immediate occasion of the paper's article is news that the German press is perturbed over the return of Germans in Tyrol, a district which includes the famous Brenner pass through the mountains. The pass is the shortest route between central Germany and Italy and marks the frontier between Italy and Austria.

The Impero announces that the formation of an organization known as the "Brenner Guard" which has among its slogans: "The Italian of today is insuperable. Brenner pass is not the goal, but the starting point."

This extreme Fascist development comes less than a month after the signing of the Locarno pacts at London and a few days after the ratification by the Italian chamber of deputies of a treaty of commerce with Germany. It follows also the arrest in Palermo recently of Mrs. Ella Briggs, a New York architect as a German spy.

The Impero says Italy never will play second fiddle to Germany again. It demands that Germany shall expiate her criminal folly, that Germany never aspire to the possession of colonies, that Austria be prevented from joining Germany against Italy and that Italy forever hold the Brenner pass, acquired as a result of the war.
