Cold Weather Hits Texas Citrus Fruit

DALLAS, Tex., Dec. 28. (AP)—Winter laid a heavy hand on sunny Texas yesterday and today, taking its toll even in the winter garden section of the Rio Grande valley. Temperatures ranged from 10 above at Amarillo, the coldest place, to 25 at Galveston, the warmest. Citrus fruit has been damaged to some extent in the Rio Grande valley, but reports today did not estimate the damage. Brownsville, where the temperature was 26 last night, reported that orchardists are hoping for a week of cloudy weather as gradual moderation without sunshine will lessen the damage.

HIGHWAY BUILT OF SOLID ROCK

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 28. —The rock ribbed coast of Southern California, little known because of so many sandy beaches, has been conquered by roadbuilders.

The cutting of the Ventura coast stretch of the new ocean shore highway, just completed, ranks among the outstanding highway projects of the nation, in the opinion of engineers.

In a stretch of 7.4 miles, an excavation of 1,213,724 cubic yards of rock and earth was accomplished. The most expensive section was one mile through solid rock cliffs, south of Big Sycamore Canyon, where 335,086 cubic yards were moved at a cost of \$239,871.20.

Men and instruments were let down with ropes over rocky cliffs and some of the work was done while the location men were dangling in midair above the foaming breakers of the Pacific.

Two years were spent in this work to complete grading and next summer the paving will be laid.
