MAN'S ORIGIN BEING PROBED

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Dec. 29.—(AP)—The problem of the origin of man is engaging the attention of some 500 scientists, here today for the dedication of the Peabody Museum at Yale.

One section of the museum has exhibits outlining the theory of evolution. The visiting scientists already have had disagreements at meetings.

Dr. E. P. Goddard of the American museum of natural history in New York aroused a mild controversy by his assertion that man may have existed in America prior to last glacial period, contrary to prevailing scientific belief, which holds that man crossed the Bering Straits from Asia after the last pre-historic ice flood.

Dr. Goddard cited the finding of

flints found under 26 feet of glacial gravel.

Dr. Walter Hough, of the United States natural museum at Washington took exception to Dr. Goddard's conclusions on the ground that the examples found were so advanced as to preclude the possibility of their being old and inquired if it were to be assumed that man sprang full grown in America without undergoing the usual evolution as exemplified in Europe.

Dr. Goddard retorted that western Europe in primordial times was notoriously backward. "He may provoke me into saying that man originated in America, and I don't want to do that," he declared.
