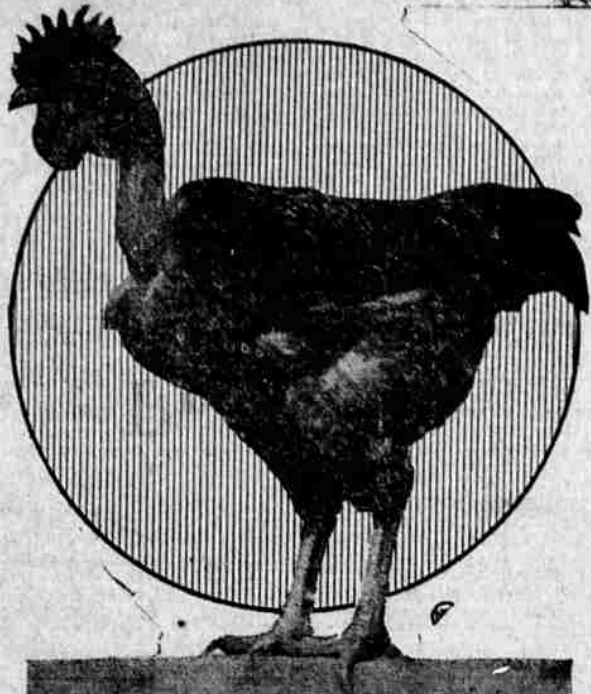
New Officers Are Installed

He plans to move into the new location as soon as alterations and renovations are completed, and will display a complete line of new sixes and fours, he announced today.

Mr. Hamaker is a son of J. O. Hamaker of Bonanza and formerly operated the Klamath Falls-Lakeview stage from this city. A complete line of parts will be carried, he said.

This is in line with the recent change in the policy of the Durant company, which is now giving the agencies for its cars to exclusive agents, Hamaker said.

To Increase Fees For Card Tables

Card tables make more money for the proprietors than pool tables, and as a result, the city license for card tables will be increased for next year, if Councilman Balsiger has his way.

Balsiger last night indicated he favored an annual license of \$10 per table, or a minimum of \$50 annually from card rooms. The police committee will make an investigation during the week and have City Attorney Carnahan draft a suitable ordinance. In the meantime, all applications for card rooms for next year will be held up until the new ordinance is drafted and passed.
