CANCER HEREDITARY

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Dec. 30. (AP)—The sole basis of cancer is heredity and people born without a strain of the disease are immune. Dr. L. C. Straub of the Bursky institute of Harvard University declared here today at the conclusion of a symposium on cancer conducted by the American society of zoologists. To this announcement however, Dr. Straub added that even where hereditary traces exist, environmental factors would seem to be necessary as irritants in order to make the disease active.

Colonel Coolidge Is Some Improved

Plymouth, Vt., Dec. 30.—(AP)—Colonel John C. Coolidge, father of the president, who is ill at his home here, passed a very comfortable night, his physician, Dr. Albert W. Gram, of Bridgewater, reported today. Colonel Coolidge, who is 61 years old, lost the use of his legs several days ago due to faulty circulation following a series of heart attacks.

"His heart and general condition are very good," the physician said. "The situation perhaps is a little better than might be expected. For the last two days Colonel Coolidge's heart action has been improved. Apart from that there is nothing new to report. I do not look for any change in the condition affecting his limbs."

Potato Crop Is Declared Short

CHICAGO, Dec. 30.—(AP)—Every man, woman and child in the United States is short about one bushel of the allowance of potatoes, it was officially disclosed today. However, new potatoes from Texas are beginning to arrive and should help somewhat to relieve the semi-famine.

According to a report from the government bureau of agricultural economics, this year's crop is equal to only 2.8 bushels per capita for the entire population against 3.75 bushels in 1924.
