### 2 Oregon Players Banned From Team

EUGENE, Ore., Dec. 31.—(P)—Ted Gillenwaters, two year veteran guard, and Charles Jost, who earned his letter last year at guard, will be ineligible for basketball this season, according to the "Scandal Sheet," a list of grades of University students, just published. The two players did not make the required grades, according to the list.

Coach Wm. Reinhart and his players, on a barnstorming tour in California, are not aware of the fact that the two men will be ineligible for the remainder of the season.

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### FOUR DEAD IN TACOMA WRECK

TACOMA, Wash., Dec. 31.—(P)—Divers will be sent down today in an effort to locate more bodies at the bottom of the city waterway in the wreckage a Tacoma municipal street car which last night plunged through the open draw of the 11th street bridge carrying four persons to death and causing injuries to four others.

One of the survivors asserts that at least a dozen persons were on the trolley at the time. This is denied, however, by the operator of the car who declares that only 3 persons were aboard.

Those known to be dead are: G. E. A. Farrow, 63; Tojijiro Obayashi, 57; Mrs. Alice Scott; Louis Scott, 5, her son. The injured: Chris Nelson, 36, arm and shoulder broken. Lucien S. Simard, 22, cuts about the face. K. Kagamoga, 40, cuts about the face.

Earl Hurd, 54, badly bruised and suffering from shock.

Failure of the breaks on the street car is blamed by Clyde Staley, operator, for the accident. Staley declared that he applied the air brakes in the usual manner as the car came on to the bridge and he noticed the warning lights on the lowered gates. At their failure to respond he used the hand brake and then released the sand and threw his motor into reverse, he asserted. The street car then struck an automobile standing before the first gate and knocked the machine through this barrier and off to one side against a second, inside gate.

Seeing that his car was beyond control and an accident unavoidable, Staley threw open the doors and, shouting a warning to the passengers, leaped out. He landed unhurt on the deck of the bridge.

Hurd, the only one of the passengers who had an opportunity to heed the warning, also leaped but not until the street car had toppled from the bridge. Hurd plunged through the air 80 feet to the waters of the bay.

The street car, which was one of those built during the war to carry ship yard workers, broke into several pieces as it fell, witnesses say. The fact probably accounted for the rescue of the four who survived.

The fact that the government has already reimbursed at least two of the six counties for money lost in taxes through the removal of these lands from the tax rolls is believed by Mr. West and others to be sufficient precedent to demand a full accounting from the government for taxes lost since these thousands of acres of land reverted to the government.

Although Klamath county's share would not be so large as some of the counties through the valley, yet it would amount to several hundred thousand dollars and is worth going after, in the belief of Mr. West and members of the Klamath county court.

### Building Permits Are Over Million

With a total of \$1,626,847 issued in building permits by Police Judge Gaghagen for the year 1925, it is evident the year will close lacking about \$46,000 of what 1924 permits were.

Forty permits were issued for the month of December and the total amounted to close to \$45,000. During December 1924 the total permits issued amounted to 34 with just \$19,316 spent.

However during the year of 1924 building permits in Klamath Falls created a sum of \$1,682,879. 1925 will close with a total of \$1,636,847.

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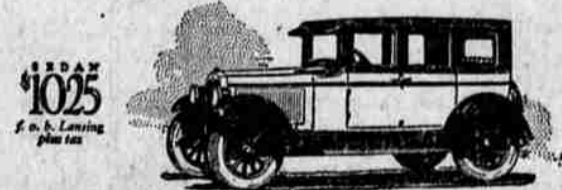
