News of this victory for the Tule lake farmers and homesteaders will be received with general rejoicing throughout Klamath county, as it is a sweeping victory for the farmers against the reclamation bureau and the secretary of the interior.

It was predicted here today that the reclamation service will make a strong fight to defeat the report of the board, but feeling was general that the recommendation will stand and that these reduction charges will be put into effect.

Marshall Orr Dies Suddenly

Widely Known Rancher Succumbs in Hotel Here

Marshall S. Orr, aged about 60, one of the best known ranchers of Klamath county, particularly in the Langley valley and the Pine Grove section, died suddenly at a local hotel early last evening from acute indigestion.

The deceased was a brother of Judge J. S. Orr of Reno, Nev., who was immediately advised by telegraph

of his brother's death. Judge Orr is due to arrive in the city tomorrow night to arrange for the funeral.

Marshall Orr had lived in Klamath county for more than a quarter of a century and had hundreds of friends in every section of the county. He was unmarried.

COUNTESS SEEKS RIGHT TO ENTER

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—(P)—Countess Catherine Karolyi today sought the aid of the courts in her fight to gain entrance to the United States.

Through her attorneys she filed in the District of Columbia supreme court a petition asking that Secretary Kellogg be forced to instruct the American consul in Paris to visa her passport.

Refusal of the secretary to issue such instructions, she said, "is arbitrary, wrongful, tyrannical and capricious."

She said further that the secretary had no right under "any valid law" to decline to admit her.

The countess was excluded on the ground that she was of communistic leanings but in her petition she said the object of her proposed visit to the United States was to "visit friends and to make a definite agreement with my agent, Mr. W. B. Freakins, Times building, New York, for a lecture tour, which I eventually wish to undertake."

"Your petitioner," she said, "was and is a non-immigrant alien desiring to visit the United States temporarily as a tourist or temporarily for business or pleasure and does not belong to any of the classes excluded from entering the United States under the immigration act of 1924—or any other act now in force."

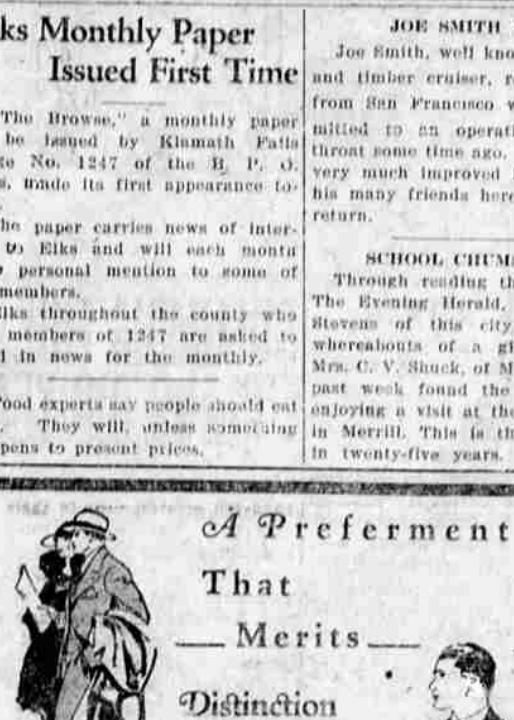
