

"POSTPONE YOUR FUNERAL" PLEA MADE BY MEDIC

Too Little Sleep Blamed for Many Troubles of U. S. City Dwellers

MANY WEAK MINDED

Number Confined in Institutions Exceeds those now in Colleges

CHICAGO, Jan. 5. (AP)—People are dying because they don't know how to live, said Dr. Gilbert Fitzpatrick, a member of the executive committee of the Georgia Memorial institute, before the Ohio society of Chicago today.

"How to postpone your funeral," was his subject.

"The great bulk of human ills," he said, "are of our own making. They are mainly avoidable and greatly within our own control. People overeat, overwork and overtax their bodies and mental energies. Along with these conditions go insufficient sleep and exercise. I think the urban half of our population is getting along on too little sleep."

This makes for nervous neurotic persons. It certainly is a sad commentary on our population when we are forced to acknowledge that the numbers of insane, mentally deficient and mentally abnormal—the mentally degenerates—segregated from society in the institutions of our country exceed the number (600,000) of students from our colleges and universities.

"Improvement lies along the path of education. We must teach the individual members of society how to live healthy lives so that the declining life cycle may be productive and happy and not looked upon with dismay or sorrow."

"To obtain a long and capable life, the best safeguard, apart from careful and rational living, is the periodical health. The examinations are just as logical as overhauling your automobile engine."

"The American people in the middle span of life are dying faster than any other white people in the world. The reason is ascribed to their habits of living."

Peddlers Lose Suit To Cut License Cost

SALLEM, Ore., Jan. 5. (AP)—The supreme court today, in an opinion by Justice Belt, upheld the constitutionality of the so-called peddlers' license tax imposed by an act of the 1925 legislature. The case was an original proceeding in mandamus brought by Clyde Evans, Earl Bunting and Edward M. Finer, all members of the Travelers' Protective association, against Secretary of State Koser. The action sought to compel the secretary of state to accept license fee payments on certain commercially used motor vehicles according to the regular license fee schedule, and not to demand an additional 50 per cent of the regular fee on each car.

Contention that the act was unconstitutional was based on three points: That it abridges the privileges and immunities of citizens of the United States; that it grants to a class of citizens privileges and immunities not granted other persons; that it is not uniform in its application to all owners of commercially used cars.

P. O. Report Shows Big Increase Here

Postmaster John McCall yesterday completed his quarterly report, which was by far the largest he has ever turned in to the assistant postmaster general at Washington, D. C. The report which must be in Washington not later than the tenth of each month, shows the largest gain the local office has ever experienced in the history of Klamath Falls.

Close to 50 boxes are open for rental at the office, according to the report of McCall and the post office is anxious these be rented by the tenth of this month.

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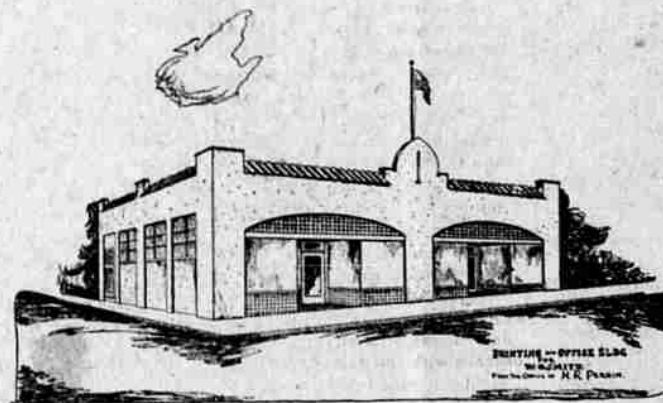
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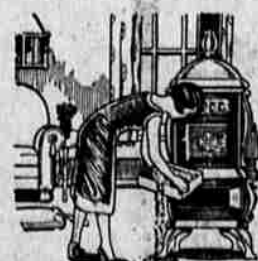
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
