SOUTHERN BAPTIST BAPTISMS SET NEW EVANGELISTIC MARK

NASHVILLE, Tenn.—(AP)—With
the administering of 1,037,550 bap-
tisms by the Southern Baptist church
during the last five years, a new
evangelistic record for six successive
denominations has been established,
said Dr. E. P. Alldredge, statistical
secretary.

Dr. Alldredge said that this is an
average of 207,510 baptisms annu-
ally for the five years of 1920-24, in-
clusive, and 48 baptisms for every
daylight hour.

The highest previous record of
Southern Baptists in baptisms was
714,333 for the five-year period of
1915-19, inclusive.
