Radio To Be In State Of Chaos Unless New Laws Are Passed, View Of Statesman

Only 89 Wave Lengths to be Divided Among 500 Stations Furnishes Puzzle Which Is Becoming Worse Daily, Lawmaker Says

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6. (AP)—New legislation at this session of congress is essential to prevent "chaos in radio broadcasting and communication," Secretary Hoover today told the house merchant marine committee, which is considering the radio reduction bill presented by Representative White, republican, Maine.

Mr. Hoover recommended passage of the bill as meeting "the present public necessity," pointing out that congestion in broadcasting has produced the most pressing need for legislation. He declared the radio public and industry was in accord with provisions of the measure.

The bill gives the government jurisdiction over all phases of radio communication as they relate to interstate and foreign commerce and the secretary expressed belief that federal supremacy is absolutely essential if this system of communication is to be preserved and advanced.

Government control over licenses and wave lengths, as now in effect in the commerce department, also is provided.

Pointing out that there are now 536 major broadcasting stations in the country, Mr. Hoover said there were only 89 wave lengths to be distributed among them, with many of the wave lengths below effective use.

"The problem," he continued "has been to try to divide 89 wave lengths among more than 500 stations, which means an average of over 6 stations to each wave length. Satisfactory division has been a mathematical impossibility.

Only by time division, power limitation, geographical separation and other expedients has it been possible to preserve any order at all in the ether.

"There are some 250 applications for new stations before the department now. If they were allowed, and the number thereby increased by nearly 50 per cent, the whole broadcasting service will be effectively destroyed. From the viewpoint of public service, we need fewer stations rather than more."

Mr. Hoover approved also the provision of the bill setting up a national committee of nine members to act in advisory capacity to the secretary of commerce in radio matters. The clause stipulating that decision of the board in controversies over radio privileges would be final and binding, subject only to appeal to the courts, the secretary regarded as a "highly important provision."

Representative Davis, democrat, Tennessee, suggested that it might be better to establish a permanent commission with jurisdiction not only over radio but over telephone and telegraph lines. The secretary replied that the radio situation is concerned largely with scientific development but if such control were provided for other communication services, "it would be logical to extend it to radio."

He remarked that for years congress had been creating commissions and allowing public officials to exercise "semi-judicial and quasi-legislative powers," while "we have permitted the foolish policy of delegating administrative functions to commissions."

Radio control in his opinion was largely an administrative problem.

SENATE ASKED TO PROBE REGIME OF U. S. R. S. HERE

the whole range from careless administration to actual disposition of assets of great value, without compensation to the water users, the state or the federal government.

When Secretary Work came into office and announced that the charges we make against Reclamation Service operations in Klamath were true of all the federal reclamation projects, we hoped that relief was in sight and we made every effort to obtain that relief through regular departmental channels. This project appeared before the Fact Finding Commission in Salt Lake City in 1924, before the Secretary of the Interior and his Commissioner of Reclamation here in April, 1925, and before the Departmental Board of Survey and Adjustment in May, 1925. We have used every regular means to secure through the Department an amelioration of the conditions that the water users have borne in the past but are unable and unwilling to bear longer.

These efforts have been absolutely unproductive of results. The benefits of the Act of Congress of December 5, 1924 have been withheld from us; the Secretary has "interpreted" it out of all semblance to its original meaning; the Departmental boards we appear before now seem to have decided our case before its hearing and either make no report or their recommendations are not put into practice.

In regard to repayments to the Government this Project stands near the top of the list of all the federal reclamation projects. For this fact the Secretary gives us no credit and the water users have maintained this standing at so great a sacrifice to themselves that they cannot much longer continue.

Because of the hopelessness of securing an adequate relief through the Department the people of the Klamath Project, Klamath Irrigation District, now appeal to you, our Congressional Representatives, and ask that the affairs of this Project and particularly the items on the list hereto appended be investigated by the U. S. Senate before its Committee on Irrigation and Reclamation at the earliest possible time.

Our case is prepared and we are ready to offer evidence and proof, if you will afford us the opportunity to do so, that the conduct of affairs on the Klamath Project by the Bureau of Reclamation is retarding the development and may drive to absolute bankruptcy an area in southern Oregon and northern California almost half as large as the state of Maryland that should be, and could be, one of the most prosperous sections of the United States.

The things we particularly wish investigated in the conduct of affairs of this Project are:

1. The consummation of a contract with the California Oregon Power company whereby that company acquired use of water from a government reservoir without charge and control of the main source of water supply of the Klamath Project for a period of fifty years.

We claim, and are prepared to offer proof, that this contract was law, that it is to the detriment of the public interest, that it is against the public policy of the Government, violates comity with the State of Oregon, and that valuable rights were disposed of by this contract without compensation to the water users, citizens of Oregon and California, or to the federal government.

2. The sale of two power canals of this project to the California Oregon Power company by the In-

terior Department, which sale was made over the protest of the water users who owned or would own them, and for a vastly inadequate, a nominal, compensation.

We further claim and are prepared to offer proof, that in order to present a semblance of legality for this sale, at the instance of the Bureau of Reclamation, an amendment was added to a contract between the Interior Department and the water users without the knowledge of the water users.

3. We wish the Senate to inquire why the Bureau of Reclamation found it necessary to interfere in the internal affairs of this district by attempting, for a period of two years, to influence water users' elections by publishing on the eve of elections misleading so-called "confidential" departmental reports and so-called "confidential" letters emanating from the bureau of Reclamation, and by misleading statements in the public press.

We wish the Senate to inquire why the Bureau of Reclamation found it necessary to state publicly that unless men acceptable to it were elected to the directorate of this District that further development of this great and solvent Project would be stopped.

The Bureau of Reclamation has stated publicly that it has severed relations with the management of this District, two members of which were elected by the water users by a vote of almost three to one, and we wish the Senate to determine if such severance of relations was justified, necessary or advisable.

4. We wish the Senate to investigate and determine why the Secretary of the Interior refuses to grant a moratorium on construction payments to this Project after Congress at his request gave him authority to do so.

In this connection we wish to offer evidence and proof that the condition of this Project on account of change in the original plans, demands that a very considerable amount of work be done immediately to save the productive lands of the Project from becoming progressively and rapidly unproductive; that there is no hope under the present regime of having this urgently necessary work done as construction and that it will, therefore, be necessary to do it as an operation and maintenance charge unless the Government's five million dollar investment here is to be lost and more than one thousand farmers become eventually bankrupt; and that if the work is done as an operation and maintenance charge that the three year moratorium granted by Congress and arbitrarily withheld by the Secretary of the Interior must be granted this Project.

5. We wish the Senate to investigate the failure of the Secretary of the Interior to permit the benefits of the Act of Congress of December 5, 1924, known as the Fact Finders' Bill, which bill, we are informed, originated in his office, had his approval and was passed at his solicitation, to pass to the water users.

We wish the Senate to investigate and determine if the Secretary of the Interior has not "interpreted" this Act out of all semblance to its original meaning and in a way to allow the least benefit to pass to the water users.

6. We wish the Senate to inquire why the Bureau of Reclamation inserted a clause in an operation and maintenance contract submitted by it to this District which would, in effect, deprive the District of water rights of great value without compensation therefor, and whether the Bureau did not withhold the benefits of the Act of December 5, 1924, from the District and offer it as a "bait" to secure the adoption of this contract containing this and other pernicious clauses.

7. The District wishes the opportunity of showing the Senate that the present plans for the future reclamation of this Project will lose to the Project at least 100,000 acres of the very best land of the Project; to submit evidence that well

Board to Decide Fate of Prisoner

SAN QUENTIN, Calif., Jan. 6. (AP)—The California state board of prison directors is to decide at its meeting at Folsom prison next Saturday whether John Redding, supposed brother of Russell Scott, Chicago murderer, is to be paroled into the custody of the Chicago police, or to serve the remainder of his term in

San Quentin prison for a burglary. Redding, whose lips are sealed as regards the Chicago identification, was returned to the prison today from a convict road camp, after the San Francisco police had identified him as the long sought Robert Scott, on whom Russell Scott had placed the murderer's brand. He is known to the prison authorities here only as John Redding, and he will remain under that name and in a California prison until the Chicago police complete the identification.

Germany Quivers When Quake Hits
