

DIVISION HEAD OF STATE ROADS ON INSPECTION

**Charles Wanzer, Bend, Ore.
Looks Over Klamath Territory Yesterday**

Klamath's new division state highway engineer, Charles Wanzer, is making his first inspection of roads in this county. Mr. Wanzer, accompanied by R. H. Baldor, state highway maintenance engineer, made a thorough inspection of highways in the vicinity of Fort Klamath yesterday.

Today he drove out the Ashland-Klamath Falls highway to Medford and will return either this afternoon or tomorrow.

Mr. Wanzer will make his headquarters at Bend. Formerly the division offices were in Klamath Falls, but for the purpose of economy, the Klamath and Lake county state highways were placed under the jurisdiction of the office at The Dalles. This move aroused a storm of protest from Klamath Falls civic bodies, and as a result the division offices were moved to Bend, where all sections of the enlarged division can be more adequately served.

Way engineer of Klamath, will remain stationed in Klamath county. His work is confined largely to the maintenance of state highways, and it is expected Klamath will secure as good service in this respect as in the past.

Probe of Foreign Influence in U.S. Stopped in Senate

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6. —(P)—By a vote of eight to three the senate foreign relations committee today killed the resolution of Senator Reed, democrat, Missouri, proposing an investigation whether international bankers and foreign governments are seeking to influence the foreign policy of the American government.

Soon after the committee adjourned, Senator Reed got his resolution before the senate and began a speech in which he declared the world court and the foreign debt settlements had behind them the most astonishing propaganda this country and perhaps the world has ever known.

"An organization has emissaries in every hamlet of the United States, has sent out literature by the ton and has paid agents over the United States to produce sentiment favoring this government going into the league court," he said. "I believe an equally organized effort is being made for the purpose of decaying the United States into debt settlements for which Italy and other countries stand."

Dr. R. Craver In Jail Until Jury Convenes

**Decision on Cases Will
Probably be Handed
Down This Week**

Dr. R. B. Craver, local physician, and W. Davis, former local bootblack, are in jail in Portland awaiting the decision of the federal grand jury charged with possession of narcotics without a government seal on Dr. Craver is charged with possession of and sale of narcotics. They were arrested on the night of December 21.

The two men are represented by William Marx, Klamath Falls attorney, who for the past week has been in Portland representing them before federal authorities. Mr. Marx has just returned from Portland.

Until the grand jury either indicts Craver and Davis, the pair will remain in jail. After the meeting of the investigative body, they will be released, or if held, bond will be set.

Inman, charged with operating an automobile while under the influence of intoxicating liquor, was postponed yesterday by Acting Justice of the Peace R. A. Emmitt. 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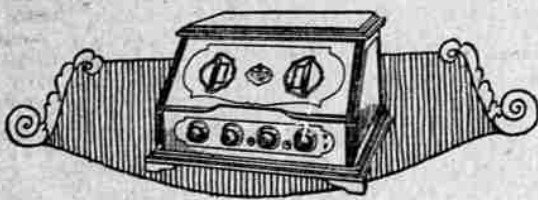
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
