DALLAS MAN IS
HELD FOR DEATH
OF J. C. HAYTERRaymond Miller Indicted on
Charge of Involuntary
Manslaughter

PLEADS NOT GUILTY

Fatal Auto Collision Results
in Serious Criminal
Accusation

DALLAS, Ore., Jan. 7. (AP)—Indicted by the Polk county grand jury which reported late last night, on a charge of manslaughter, Raymond Miller of Dallas, whose automobile ran down and inflicted fatal injuries on J. C. Hayter, pioneer editor and merchant of Dallas, this morning entered a plea of not guilty.

Arraigned for a preliminary hearing, Miller asked that an attorney be appointed to defend him, and the court named J. O. Holman. His trial has been set to open at 1 o'clock on Monday afternoon, the first day of the January term of the circuit court.

R. L. Janeway of Amity, indicted for the larceny of 1000 pounds of clover seed from the Perrydale warehouse, waived his preliminary hearing, pled guilty and was sentenced to serve four years in the state penitentiary.

Three secret indictments were also returned by the grand jury.

Another Earth
Tremor Shakes
San FranciscoSharp Quake Reported
There Last Evening

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 7. (AP)—A sharp earthquake was felt in the San Francisco Bay region at 9:45 o'clock last night. Two distinct shocks, lasting about five seconds, were felt in Oakland, while San Francisco and points south along the peninsula, received a sharp shock.

The shock was sufficiently intense in some districts to rattle windows and sway pictures on the walls.

Along the water front the tremor was distinct and continuous, the naval radio station reported.

In Marin county, north of here, residents at the foot of Mount Tamalpais received a sharp shock lasting several seconds.

The duration of the shock has not been definitely determined, but is said to have lasted about five seconds.

No damage was done.

To Arraign Doctor
On Perjury Charge

MEDFORD, Ore., Jan. 7. (AP)—Dr. Charles T. Sweeney, prominent local physician, former coroner of Grant Falls, Cascade Co. Mont., and member of the Oregon legislature from Josephine county in 1920, will be arraigned for pleading January 12 on a perjury charge in connection with the trial of Oscar W. Murphy, under 15 year sentence in state prison of a manslaughter charge. The indictment grew out of testimony Dr. Sweeney gave relative to being present the entire time of the post mortem on the body of Mrs. Murphy.

Seine River Now
Near Flood Stage

PARIS, Jan. 7. (AP)—A rapid rise of the river Seine last night and this morning brought its height at the Ansterlitz bridge, in the heart of the city, to within eight feet of the disastrous flood level of 1910, when the most destructive floods in the history of Paris occurred. The river is within less than six feet of the level of the 1924 overflow.

Chamber Movie
Will Be Shown
To EasternersCommittee Plans to
Buy Two More Films
on Crater

Thousands of "cliffed" easterners, bored to tears with the clash and clang of metropolitan life and hungering for the clear skies and beautiful scenery of the country out west, will view this year the moving picture entitled "The Origin of Crater Lake," which will be sent to chamber of commerce and large motion picture houses of eastern states, by the Klamath county chamber of commerce.

This was the announcement this morning by Lynn P. Sabin, secretary of the chamber, following recent decision by the community advertising committee of the chamber to purchase two more films of the "Origin of Crater Lake."

The remarkable success in San Francisco and Portland of the Crater Lake picture, which was sent to large moving picture houses last summer by the local chamber, leads to the firm belief that the success of the picture in the east, will be even more effective.

The advertising that will accrue to this country will be invaluable. It is believed. Crater Lake is the big selling point of Oregon and Crater Lake is in Klamath. Although the geological phenomenon is the main feature to the picture, still there will be several scenes of Klamath Falls, designed as one of the gateways to Crater Lake.

For the purpose of determining whether or not the present picture of the origin of Crater Lake should be changed, before the order for two more pictures is sent to Hollywood, the community advertising committee of the chamber of commerce will attend a pre-view of the picture in the Pine Tree theater this afternoon at 4 o'clock. The committee is composed of R. E. Crego, director in charge, W. W. McNeely, chairman, E. J. Murray, H. S. Mathews, Ben W. Stevenson, H. W. Poole, A. H. Raymond and F. S. Walte.

Wife Throws

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 7. (AP)—Mrs. Mabel Mayer, wife of Leo Mayer, head of the Mayer Productions company of Los Angeles, is held in the city prison here charged with throwing acid in the face of Miss Eliza Granger, an actress, who says she is employed by the Mayer company.

Mrs. Mayer called detectives to her home early today and pointing to a newspaper account of the acid throwing said: "It is correct" she declined to say anything further.

Miss Granger was in the rear room of a downtown hotel when a woman threw a vial of acid in her face saying "You'll never break up another home, I'll mar you for life." The woman then rushed out of the hotel and disappeared.

Vesuvius Reported
in Eruption Again

NAPLES, Jan. 7. (AP)—Vesuvius is rumbling and emitting smoke and lava but in small quantities. The phenomenon last night attracted large crowds of foreigners who watched the glow from the crater as it enveloped the snow capped mountain. The present eruption is only one of the ordinary outbreaks of the volcano.

FEDERAL PROBE
OF BIG MURDER
MYSTERY OPENSGrand Jury Takes up Inves-
tigation Into Osage
Indian Deaths

WITNESSES GUARDED

Death Threats in Hotel
Thought Made—Woman
is Involved

GUTHRIE, Okla., Jan. 7. (AP)—Federal grand jury investigation of the Osage murder mystery opened today.

The identity of the opening witness was not revealed, but he was said to have been "important."

Oliver Pagan and O. H. Loring, department of justice executives, from Washington, arrived today and it is understood that they will play an active part in the probe.

Reported Gun Play

There were reports today that could not be confirmed, of gun play yesterday at a hotel where a number of men are under guard as witnesses.

Street reports connected a woman with the affair and said that serious trouble was narrowly averted.

A dramatic incident occurred in the room of W. L. Clineham, a witness brought from Oswego, Kansas, when Mary Starr, a relative of Henry Starr, former notorious Oklahoma outlaw, accused the man of being a member of Starr's old gang.

Identity Revealed

Entering the room where Clineham was kept, she pointed at him and said:

"I know you. You went under the name of W. E. Kirby, but your real name is Clineham, and you used to be a member of the old Starr gang." Clineham made no response.

Institutions of
Oregon Have Big
Growth for Year

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 7. (AP)—The total population of Oregon state institutions increased from 4483 to 6939 January 1, 1926, according to the records of the state board of control. The present population of the several institutions is: State hospital, 1851; penitentiary, 470; feeble minded institution, 788; boys training school, 189; tuberculosis hospitals, 153; blind school, 44; deaf school, 119; girls industrial school, 71; eastern Oregon insane hospital, 788; soldiers home 116; adult school for blind in Portland 51.

Officers Seek
Missing Funds

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 7. (AP)—Officers working on the case of J. K. Frank, fugitive check kiting financier, who is charged with defrauding Los Angeles banks of more than \$380,000 today were seeking to trace the supposed hiding place of \$200,000 of Frank's loot in Advances from Portland that Frank's auto had been seen there after he fled Los Angeles New Year's eve and the belief of his pursuers that he is actually hiding in Mexico have given rise to the theory that he rushed north, hid the bulk of his plunder and then doubled back southward, where he intends to hide if possible.

Nord Resigns
Scouting Job At
Noon TodayQuits Post Rather Than
Embroid Local
Officers

Submitting his resignation to take effect at once, Scout Executive Everett O. Nord today closed his duties as executive of the scouts of Klamath county.

During his two months as head of the scouts throughout the county, Mr. Nord has done much towards developing scouting and getting boys throughout the county organized and interested in the movement. At the present time 133 boys are scouts, with 17 scout leaders in the county, 12 outside of the city, making a total of 29 throughout the county.

Under his leadership the boys have taken an active part in a number of civic affairs and scouting has been brought into activity. At the time he took over his duties, the first of November, just two troops were functioning, one was practically dormant and the other was gradually dying out.

At the present Mr. Nord has not definitely decided upon his future work, but expects to remain in Klamath Falls. Just recently he moved his wife and two children here from Portland.

Although the local scout committee has been greatly impressed with Mr. Nord's work among the boys, the local council has been refused a national charter because Nord was not endorsed by the regional council at Spokane. Rather than precipitate local scout leaders into an argument with national officers, Mr. Nord withdrew from the field to protect the interests of the boys with whom he has been doing such a splendid work.

The city council refused to impeach the mayor after a campaign led by the Rev. Dr. Ambrose M. Bailey ended in a grand jury recommendation of impeachment or recall.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 7. (AP)—More than \$1,000,000 will be expended this year by the Spokane, Portland and Seattle railway system in improvements to its lines and transportation facilities. This was announced by W. F. Turner, the president, today, on his return from St. Paul, where he and General Manager A. J. Davidson and chief engineer A. J. Wittell went last week to confer on budget matters with the Great Northern and Northern Pacific owning interests.

WANT TO EXPEL
MORE STUDENTS
OF UNIVERSITYPublication of Racy Maga-
zine, "The Lash" Causes
Drastic Action

EDITOR IS DISMISSED

George Washington Univer-
sity Officials Seek Names
of Assistants

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7. (AP)—George Washington university officials today were considering expulsion of other students connected with the Lash, new and unofficial publication of the school, and whose editor, John R. Brommel, had been dismissed.

Brommel, whose first issue of the Lash was described by William Mather Lewis, president of the university, as "positively indecent," was contemplating court action to gain re-instatement and declared he would print another and "hotter" edition of the magazine. In it, an announcement said, would appear the two love letters which caused a sensation in the Rhinelander annual suit in New York, and which were not published.

Brommel Dismissed

Brommel was dismissed by President Lewis when he refused voluntarily to withdraw and after accepting full responsibility for the publication.

Dr. Lewis said the Lash generally was in "exceedingly bad taste." But he objected particularly to an article attacking the moral character of George Washington while he lived at Mount Vernon.

"The University carries the name of the father of his country," he declared, "and the article, besides being obscene, is unpatriotic."

Seeking Others

Associates of Brommel, whose names are being sought by university authorities, were said to be rallying to his support in an effort to have him re-instated and obtain authority to continue the publication of the magazine. Brommel contended his dismissal grew out of his campaign against "an all-powerful fraternity clique" ruling the university.

The Lash was produced, an announcement in it said, to "log in plain and unmistakable language a protest against the existence of the fraternal oligarchy which dominates all student affairs at the university."

Smoking To
Make Women
Alter Looks

NEW YORK, Jan. 7. (AP)—Women, if they continue to smoke, will look like men, Joseph Byrne, managing director of the national beauty shop owners convention said today. The tobacco face is becoming more common among women, he added.

"Features of women who smoke," he said, "grow sharper as the nicotine habits grow upon them. The skin becomes taut and sallow. The lips lose their rosy color. The corners of the mouth show wrinkles. The lower lip shows a tendency to project beyond the upper lip. The eyes acquire a stare and the lids rise and fall more slowly."

MANCHURIAN WAR
HEAD TO RETIRE

TOKYO, Jan. 7. (AP)—Vernacular advice from Mukden, capital of Manchuria, say that Marshal Chang Tso-Lin, Manchurian war lord, has announced his retirement. The foreign office has received no confirmation of the announcement but the spokesman for the office said the report was believed probable.

Hold Funeral
of Well Known
Trail BlazerLucien B. Applegate
Was Buried This
Morning

Memories of the Applegate covered wagon train, of a contented one-year old babe, of pioneer days when there were no fences, of the time when Indians really danced the war dance, and of the hardships and privations of early life in Klamath, pervaded the funeral service this morning at 10 o'clock, of Lucien B. Applegate, the last member of the covered wagon train led out to the West in 1849 by Lindsey Applegate. Lucien was but one year old when he was brought across the plains to the western country.

It was a remarkable gathering in the quiet chapel in Whitlock's funeral home this morning. A single glance over the bent white heads was sufficient to prove that here was a gathering of pioneer characters who have formed the foundation of prosperity and stability of Klamath.

These pioneers were there to pay their last tribute to a man respected and admired during his lifetime and mourned at his death. It was of the original blood of civilized Klamath that gathered around the funeral casket this morning as probably it will never gather again.

Among the familiar faces seen at the funeral were Captain O. C. Applegate, brother of the deceased; C. R. Delap, James Straw, Marion Hanks, George Humphrey, J. W. Bryant, Judge John S. Orr of Reno, Nev., and former county judge of Klamath, B. S. Grigsby, G. G. Anderson, R. A. Emmitt, Rufus Moore, Mrs. Addie Walker, Mrs. Sarah Gowan, Frank Ward, Mrs. Jennie Hurn, Fred Colman and John Jensen.

Funeral services were conducted by the Masonic lodge, of which Mr. Applegate had been a member. The Rev. A. L. Rice spoke a few appropriate words in commemoration of the deceased.

In the Odd Fellows cemetery, by the side of his wife, who preceded him by two years, the body of Lucien Applegate was laid this morning. Pall bearers were H. E. Momery, Judge L. L. Gaghagen, George Humphrey, Marion Hanks, Arthur Maddox and John McCall.

One Dead And
Heavy Damage
Storm's TollBlizzard Sweeps Thru
Mountain States

DENVER, Colo., Jan. 7. (AP)—A blizzard like storm swept through sections of the rocky mountain region yesterday and continued in some parts today, leaving in its wake one person dead and many automobiles stalled in heavy snow-drifts.

Arthur F. Ward, Pueblo, Colo., was killed when his automobile plunged from a bridge during the storm. Scores of motorists were stalled in the roads of southeastern Colorado and more than a foot of snow was reported at Crow, Colo. Indications of the storm came from as far south as Albuquerque, N. M., where the snow melted as it fell.

Heavy winds and drifting snows have hampered automobile traffic and air mail pilots in Rock Springs, Wyo., district for the last 36 hours and one plane was wrecked without injury to the pilot.

The weather man promised some relief for today with generally fair skies and rising temperatures in some portions.

Despondent Girl
Commits Suicide

BERKELEY, Calif., Jan. 7. (AP)—Marion Bailey, 17, a student at the University high school in Oakland, committed suicide here today by swallowing poison. Her mother stated that the girl was despondent because the school authorities endeavored to compel her to wear regulation gymnasium shoes in her gymnasium classes instead of a special shoe that had been prescribed by a physician for fallen arches.

SPINK DOES NOT
WANT CHILOQUIN
TO INCORPORATEMagistrate Says Taxes
Would be too High in
West Chiloquin

HEARING YESTERDAY

Dispute Will be Ironed out
January 16; Legal
Angles Difficult

Chiloquin, picturesque and growing community of the Klamath Indian reservation, wants to become an incorporated town. Prominent citizens of the reservation center appeared before the county court yesterday afternoon and made their wants known by a petition.

But there was a remonstrance to the incorporation petition, a vigorous protest voiced by R. C. Spink, owner of land in what is known as West Chiloquin and which is located across the Williamson river from the main settlement, and along the west bank of the river.

Taxes Too High

In substance, Spink, who is also justice of the peace, of the Chiloquin district, does not want the town to be incorporated, because if his land were to be within the boundaries of the proposed incorporated town, as it undoubtedly would be, the increased taxes which would naturally come, would be too great a burden for him to handle financially.

The petition for the incorporation was presented by A. C. Glenger, prominent merchant and business man of Chiloquin. It was brought out in the hearing yesterday that the present population of the town was 400.

The county court listened to the arguments pro and con on the question and finally decided to continue the hearing until Saturday, January 16.

Legal Angles

"There are," County Judge Bunnell explained this morning, "several legal points in connection with the remonstrance by Spink, which must be ironed out before we may act with safety on the incorporation of Chiloquin."

Lumber development, improvement of roads and other contributing factors to the natural growth of any prosperous settlement, have brought a steady and substantial growth to Chiloquin during the past two years. In place of ramshackle buildings, and a general untidy appearance of the town, there are now neat brick buildings and a clean tidy appearance to the "Main street."

City Hall Safe
At Gold Hill Is
Opened By Yeggs

MEDFORD, Ore., Jan. 7. (AP)—The safe of the City of Gold Hill, in the City Hall, was entered some time the first of the week, and city and public records kept therein scattered about the room. The deed was discovered late Wednesday afternoon. The sheriff investigated and found the safe unharmed. He attributed the mischief to political spite. A check of the papers showed none missing.

NATE OTTERBEIN
OUT AFTER JOB
AS POSTMASTER

Nate Otterbein has decided to go after the postoffice crown that has been worn by John A. McCall for the past four years, and with that end in view he has been quietly circulating a petition among his friends and others asking their indorsement of his aspirations. A similar petition in behalf of Mr. McCall was in evidence yesterday and it is being generously signed by the business men and other patrons of the post office.

SALES FOR U. S.
