An exchange says: After a ten-year period of legislation against speeding automobiles, the driving public has turned its attention to the slow car as the greatest menace of the road. Last year, for instance Indiana increased the speed limit from twenty-five to thirty-five miles an hour, and in many other states and most cities, the traffic officers are beginning to frown upon the man who slows up the procession. At the recent meeting of the Society of Automotive Engineers in Philadelphia one state commissioner, Stoeckel of Connecticut, said: "It is almost impossible for human nature to stand the strain of following a slow car indefinitely, and sooner or later an attempt will be made to pass." And passing is hazardous where traffic is congested. Therefore, Mr. Stoeckel concludes, the cars must all keep the same speed. The slow car must get off the road. If a thirty-mile rate is established as reasonable on a road, the man who goes only twenty will be as obnoxious as the one who insists on traveling forty. Fast Are, isn't it? The lawmakers who once required the driver to get off the road and kill his engine when he met a team, now are telling him to "speed up."

STEWART'S WASHINGTON LETTER

WASHINGTON—Pie, the problem with which Congressman Clarence MacGregor of Buffalo, N. Y., is faced, seems about the hardest to solve of any at the capitol this winter.

MacGregor, as chairman of the house of representatives committee on accounts, is supreme arbiter of the destinies of the two house restaurants, the one in the office building and the one in the capitol. And in his

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opinion their pies are not what they ought to be.

The trouble is, not so much that the pies aren't pretty fair, but that old timers say they don't equal the quality of those served in the senate restaurants in the long ago, when Senator Frye of Maine, as chairman of the committee on rules, shaped their policies.

Senatorial pie, in those days, won reputations as the best in the United States.

Determined to bring his 69th congressional pie up to the level of any in the past, MacGregor spent much of his last summer's vacation in consultation with experts. He thought for awhile he had done pretty well.

When congress convened early in December the first thing he did was to invite some of the oldsters, who still hark wistfully back to the Frye era, to try his pie.

The oldsters dabbled with them listlessly.

"Ah, yes, very nice," they sighed, damning with faint praise, "but you should have tasted those pies of Frye's."

TO WORK ON STREETS

Invoking a seldom used clause of the city charter Recorder R. L. Whipple today sentenced W. G. Stober, charged with possession of liquor, to pay a fine of \$200 and serve 60 days at labor on the city streets. The charter provides that persons found guilty of violating any city ordinance may, upon being sentenced to confinement, be required to work out the confinement period by laboring on the city streets. This provision has been seldom used in the past, but, according to City Recorder Whipple, will probably be invoked more frequently in the future in dealing with habitual offenders.

Stober has been arrested for

drunkenness on several different occasions. During the recent year he was on the police docket a number of times, receiving fines varying from \$50 to \$250. He appeared today before the recorder and upon a plea of guilty was fined \$200 and sentenced to 60 days' confinement and ordered to work out the time as an assistant to the city street cleaning department. — Roseburg News.
