Signs Soon to Be Completed

Following are the streets which will be served with signs: Pine, High, Washington, Lincoln, Jefferson, Grant, Klamath avenue, Oak, Plum, Willow, Elm, Commercial, Broad, Market, Spring, Wantland avenue, East Main, Oregon avenue and all intersecting streets of these main streets, and certain streets in Mills addition and Hot Springs addition. The sign posts are six by six inches, eight feet in length and instead of cross arms bearing the names of the streets, these will be painted on the posts.
