Members of the boxing commission commended Sylvester's work as a matchmaker.

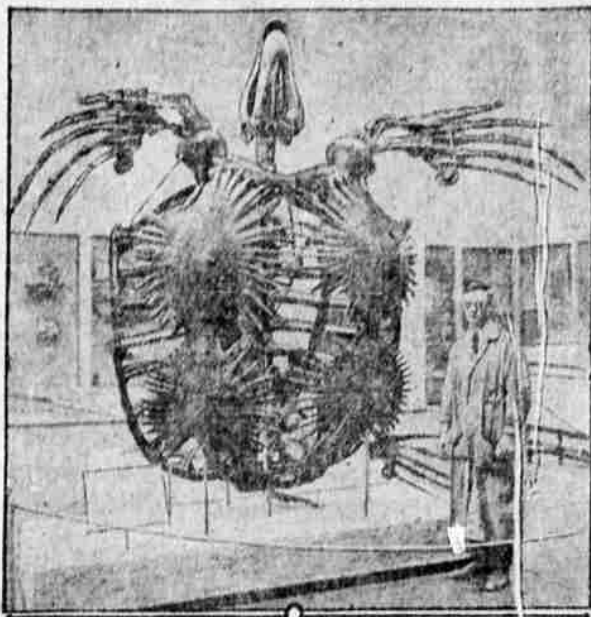
Heavy Jewelry Is Newest Fad

Henderson Is Impressed By Cheese Record

County Agent Returns From Tillamook County

Strict adherence to a high standard of production and a 100% membership in the secret to the success of the Tillamook county Creamery association.

This is the deduction of County Agent Henderson, who returned last night from a visit to Tillamook county. Mr. Henderson traveled from one end of the county to the other, inspecting methods of cheese manufacture and the famed dairy herds, from which the cream for Tillamook cheese came.

"There are 25 cheese factories in Tillamook county and all belong to the association," Mr. Henderson explained. "The association employs an expert who inspects all the product of all the 25 factories. If any of the cheese fails to come up to the high standard of the association, the representative refuses to stamp it with the 'Tillamook' association mark, and it will go on the market without the mark which guarantees the product as high grade."

"By this method, cheese of the association has gained a reputation for excellence in quality, which is a big factor in marketing. I was impressed with the dairy herds I saw. There is no question but that Tillamook county is a great dairy county. Even at this time of year the fields are green with grass."

Vivory Protests To County Court About Estimate

H. F. Vivory, local contractor, is dissatisfied with the final estimate of cost on his grading job of the Midland Market road. He has made his dissatisfaction plain to the county court, and, according to reports today has hired an attorney to represent him in the dispute.

Vivory was let the grading contract for 5½ miles of the market road last fall. Although his bid was higher than the nearest competitor, the county court let the

contract to Vivory on the ground that he promised to finish the job quicker. Vivory completed the work, according to reports, 33 days after the time stipulated in the contract.

The dispute between Vivory and County Road Engineer Frank Z. Howard, centers about the estimate of cost which was turned into the county court by County Engineer Howard when the job was completed. Mr. Howard's estimate was approximately \$12,000. Vivory claims that Howard did not credit him with enough intermediate rock excavation work and that he is the loser thereby.
