

Asks City To Buy Park Site

T. O. Hague, owner of the Hague ranch, known as 'Klamath Gardens' on the Ashland-Klamath highway one mile from the city, has addressed a letter to the city park board in which he offers either all or half of his 120 acres to the city as a public park at \$300 an acre, for all, or \$250 an acre for the east half.

Mr. Hague believes it would make an ideal site for a public park because of its proximity to the city, its frontage on the state highway

and because its many natural features of scenic beauty. It has a natural stadium large enough for Olympic games, he points out in his letter to the board.

Mr. Hague further informs the park board that should it wish to establish a park museum he can furnish nucleus for such an exhibit, consisting chiefly of ivory miniature paintings, colored portraits and other valued mementos.

FUGITIVE ONCE WAS R. R. CLERK IN THIS STATE

J. Kenneth Fronk, Alleged Kiter of Checks, is Known in Roseburg

ALWAYS IN TROUBLE
Stole Money from S. P. and Forged Rail Tickets, Assert Official

ROSEBURG, Ore., Jan. 8. (AP)—J. Kenneth Fronk, the alleged Los Angeles check kiter, for whom an international search is now in progress, was employed in Roseburg as a Southern Pacific ticket clerk in May and June of 1907 and was discharged because of discrepancies in his accounts it was learned today from records maintained by L. B. Moore, local S. P. ticket and freight agent.

Fronk was employed as night clerk in May 1907. The middle of the following month breaks were found in the sequence of tickets in a reserve supply, and this resulted in an investigation which developed the fact a number of tickets and stubs had been used from the reserve supply and no accounting made.

Admitted Guilt

According to Mr. Moore, Fronk admitted the shortage and forfeited his pay check, while his father agreed to make good the balance of the shortage.

Fronk disappeared and it was later learned that he had used a skeleton form ticket to obtain transportation for himself and a boomer brakeman to St. Paul. The ticket was made out over Southern Pacific and Union Pacific lines to St. Paul, while the stub maintained as a record in the local office, indicated that the ticket had been made out for Kalama, Wash. As the fare had been paid to Kalama, the records in the local office were straight and it was not until the ticket was returned, 60 days later, that the fraud was discovered. The skeleton tickets were being used instead of the regular forms in many offices following the San Francisco earthquake when the regular supply was destroyed.

Fronk was later employed at Albany and Red Bluff in various capacities by the Southern Pacific. It is stated, both times being employed under an alias. In each instance he was discharged when his true identity was learned.

Indian Church Cites Beliefs

Articles Of Incorporation of Shaker Church Are Filed

What are the tenets, the beliefs, the ideals and the aims of the Indian Shaker church of the Klamath Indian reservation? Where did it originate and how long has it been in existence?

These questions were answered today in the articles of incorporation of the Indian Shaker church filed today by William Moore, Jim Jackson, Robert Davis, C. Ball, Lizzie Duvall, Amy Jackson and Harry Jackson.

One of the primary teachings of the church is temperance, the articles set forth. Another is the firm belief in the second coming of Christ. A third is respect for the marriage relation and obligations of the home and a fourth condemns consumption of intoxicating liquor.

Other important features to the religion that is so popular among the Indian fraternity of the reservation are; apply the Golden Rule, that is do unto others as you have them do unto you; avoid lying or cheating or deceiving; strict adherence to all laws of the state and government.

The Shaker church, the articles state, was organized in England in 1747 and was brought to America in 1774 under the leadership of Mother Ann Lee.

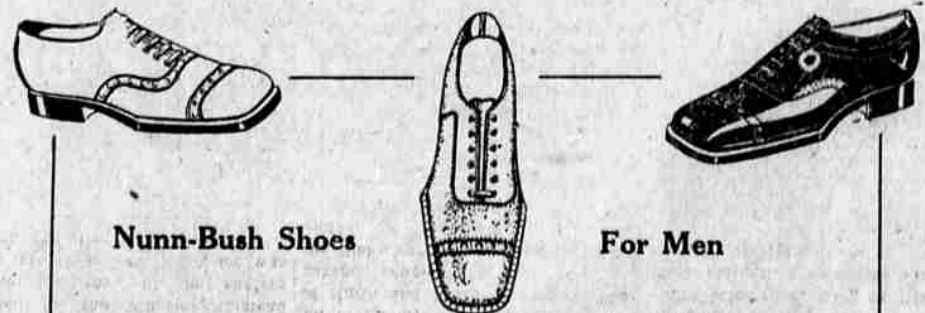
