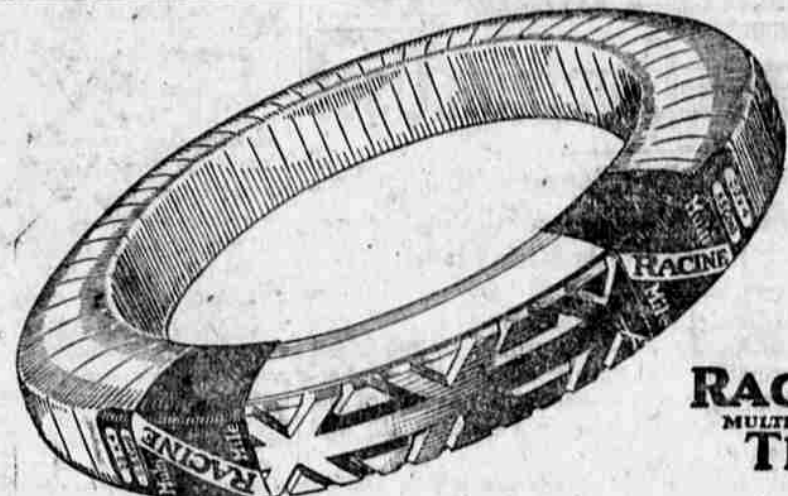
World War Vet Facing Charge

Man Who Escaped Hospital Wanted For Murder

BILLINGS, Mont., Jan. 9. —(AP)—Arthur T. Hesterly, a world war veteran, who told authorities he ran away from a government hospital at Knoxville, Iowa, last August, today was in jail facing charges for the killing of Peter Jacob, a rancher and the latter's niece, Mathilda Latsch, 19. The bodies of the two were found in a hay stack near Forsyth, Mont.

Authorities said Hesterly confessed that he exhausted the ammunition of a shotgun on the two and then "finished them off with an axe." Hesterly was removed to an adjoining county for safe keeping because of intense feeling in Forsyth today.

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R. E. Knowles And Attorney Clash In Case

Renner Threatens to Slap Officer's Face Today

"Sit down or I'll slap you in the face."

County Traffic Officer R. E. Knowles, sat, but not until he had peeled off his coat and muttered something about defending himself to W. H. A. Renner, attorney, who had commanded him to be seated.

This was just a sample of the fireworks which exploded merrily throughout the morning in justice court, during the trial of Charles Inman, charged with operating an automobile while intoxicated. Inman was arrested in December, following an automobile wreck on the North highway between Klamath Falls and Pelican City.

When Knowles took the stand for the state, the examination proceeded smoothly. In response to well connected questions by District Attorney E. L. Elliott, Knowles stated that Inman, following the accident, was so drunk that he could not stand up and that he had smelled liquor on his breath.

Renner flew into Knowles, in cross examination, and verbally raked the traffic officer over the burning coals.

"Do you ever drink, Knowles?" he asked.

"I should say not", the officer replied.

Renner laughed.

Q—"Have you ever been arrested?"

A—"No—well yes, last summer."

Hereupon Elliott and Renner engaged in a legal imbroglio over whether or not the matter of Knowles' arrest was material.

Q—"Did you carry Inman up stairs to the jail?"

A—"Well, yes."

Q—"Did you have hold of his leg or arm?"

A—"I did not have hold of anything. He walked up all right. He could walk all right."

Q—"I thought you said you and McMillan carried him upstairs."

A—"I was mistaken. He could walk all right."

And so it went, back and forth. Finally Justice of the Peace R. A. Emmitt was forced to call for order and insist upon Renner asking questions of the witness in a civil manner.

Up to a late hour this afternoon the case had not been completed.

The jury is composed of J. S. Mills, Archie Colson, F. W. Abney, John Linfesty, M. R. Doty and H. M. Hollister.

WELL DRESSED TEACHER HAS MENTAL EFFECT ON PUPILS

SAN FRANCISCO. —(AP)—Appropriately and attractively dressed public school teachers are in favor with their superintendents, Joseph Marr Gwin. The superintendent maintains that teachers should be well dressed because of the mental effect upon the children.

"The clothes of the teacher are the ornament upon which the eyes of the children are bent more frequently than anywhere else," said Mr. Gwin. "Also it is generally proved that whenever one is dressed properly and well, he or she is more optimistic and does better work."

STATE SERVICE STATION OWNERS MEET IN EUGENE

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 9. —(AP)—More than 50 delegates were here yesterday to attend the first convention of the Independent Service Station owners association of Oregon. The session was unannounced except through letters to the service station men, and nothing was known here of the convention until it was in session.

Ed Falls of Portland was elected president of the state group. Otto K. Poulas of Salem was named first vice president; Earnest Williams of Ashland, second vice president; J. A. Whitaker of Marshfield, third vice president; and J. T. Conwell of Portland, secretary-treasurer. The board of directors chosen at the close of the session is composed of L. D. Jones of Salem, H. W. Shaw of Marshfield, C. L. Wolfe of Medford, Joseph Shockley of Roseburg, Thomas L. Ohlson of Eugene, C. V. Radford of Albany and W. C. Page of Eugene.

The next annual meeting will be held in Medford in January, 1927. It was decided.

Twelve counties of the state were represented at the session. Multnomah, Washington, Marion, Polk, Lane, Jackson, Josephine, Coos, Curry, Douglas, Linn and Benton.

California Lumber Concern Buys Pine

Tarter, Webster & Johnson, a lumber concern with a big factory at Dorris, offices at San Francisco, and connections in the East, entered the Klamath timber land yesterday and purchased 160 acres of yellow pine for \$7900. The tract is located in the far northern part of the county, six miles west of the Southern Pacific railroad. It is said that the concern plans to log their holdings there and ship them to Dorris to their box factory.

The tract was bought from Mr. and Mrs. Henry Burk and is located in section 14, township 26, south Range 7, east.

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YOUNG HEIRESS MAKES BIG SALE

NEW YORK, Jan. 9. —(AP)—Fifteen year old Barbara Hutton, granddaughter of the late Frank W. Woolworth, has rung up 100,000,000 dimes in the cash register of the five and ten cent store business he founded.

Yesterday her representatives sold 50,000 shares of Frank W. Woolworth company common stock which she inherited from her grandmother, for more than \$10,000,000. It was one of the largest private sales of common stock in the recent history of Wall street.

The sale was made to investors throughout the country, yet the demand for the shares was so great that allotments had to be reduced. The market was slightly weakened as a result of the transaction, but recovered.

Barbara still has about 95,000 shares of Woolworth stock remaining from her inheritance and the proceeds from the sale in the open market of 30,000 more of her shares about a year ago. With the increased valuation of her holdings, it is estimated her total inheritance is approximately \$20,000,000, making her possibly the richest young girl in the world.

She is the daughter of Franklin L. Hutton, a broker, and Mrs. Edna Woolworth Hutton, who died in 1917. Her inheritance came from her grand mother, widow of F. W. Woolworth, who died in 1924, leaving Mrs. Jessie Woolworth Donahue, Mrs. Helen McCann, daughters, and Barbara, a granddaughter, as sole heirs of an estate then estimated at \$58,000,000.

Barbara's inheritance was 175,000 shares of the Woolworth common stock. Even before her grandmother's death, Barbara was a wealthy girl. When her mother died she was left \$411,000. She makes her home with her aunt, Mrs. Donahue.

Wins at Last.
