

WRITER TELLS OF EXPERIMENT WITH LETTUCE

New Crop on Nelson and Geary Bros. Ranch, Commented on in Publication

That Klamath is destined to be a lettuce producing center of note within the next decade, is the belief expressed in an article in the January issue of the Oregon Farmer, written by George N. Angell, in the agricultural magazine, the article headed "Klamath Farmers Try Out Lettuce," is the "lead story" and is graphically supported by a picture showing a scene of lettuce packing and loading.

Mr. Angell reviews the start of lettuce in Klamath, telling how Roy

Nelson, Worden farmer, undertook the experiment with the crop and of his success. Then he tells of the visit of Warren Hunt of the wholesale lettuce manufacturing and producing concern, Sawdoy and Hunt.

Mr. Hunt visited the Geary brothers' ranch in Wagon valley, a short distance from the city limits, and was impressed with the possibilities of this land for lettuce. The result on the land which had only grown scratch grain, was that 20 car loads of lettuce were harvested and sent east to favorable markets.

Condemn Gag Now in Place On Filipinos

Solon Hits Iron Rule of
Army General in
Provinces

WASHINGTON, Pan. 11. —(AP)—"General Wood has heretofore refused to let Filipinos act. Now it seems he is going to refuse to let them talk, and, I suppose, the next thing he will do will be to refuse to let them think."

Thus Representative Jones, democrat, Texas, assailed the governor general of the Philippines in the house, while commenting on "the Associated Press" dispatch from Manila stating that Antonio Pagula, of the Manila city council had been convicted of using insulting words toward General Wood.

Declaring that "General Wood is not in sympathy with the aspirations of Filipinos," Representative Jones regretted the appointment at the head of a civil government, "a military man whose training is against the instincts and genius of true democracy."

"Stronger words than those uttered by Pagula have been used in campaigns in this country," Representative Jones said, "and the Filipinos 'goes to show that Wood is a dictator' in the islands."

Representative Bacon of New York entered the discussion in defense of the governor general, declaring that he had been a visitor in the islands at the time of the court proceedings against Pagula and could state authoritatively that General Wood had nothing to do with the case. Another member of the house interrupted Jones in his attack to say that the court which convicted Pagula was composed of Filipinos.

AMBASSADOR IS TOO PUGNACIOUS

TOKYO, Jan. 11. —(AP)—The Black Dragon and other reactionary societies have sent a resolution to the government to take action looking to the recall of De Lima Silva, the Brazilian ambassador for allegedly beating up two policemen who prevented him from crossing the street in front of a procession in which Crown Prince Hirohito was participating.

The societies and the police are most indignant over the affair, but they assert that their hostility is directed toward the ambassador and not Brazil. The government announces

as that the matter is a private one between the police and the ambassador and no action has been taken officially.

Honor De Lima Silva and his wife narrowly escaped being mobbed Friday morning when they attempted to cross the street near Akasaka palace in front of the regent, the crown prince. The ambassador later in a note said he understood the policeman to say "Please come here" when he actually said "Prince, come here."

The ambassador struck a policeman with his cane and he had to be taken to a hospital. The crowd then attempted to mob the envoy.

Small Islands Are Reserved

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11. —(AP)—Reservation in public ownership of a number of small islands in the Pacific ocean off Coos and Clatsop counties, Oregon, is authorized in an executive order issued today on recommendation of the secretary of the interior. The purpose of the withdrawal is to convert the islands into permanent bird reservations and to prevent their private exploitation.

The islands include Cove, or Table Rock, Haystack Rock, Bird Rock, Gull Rocks, the Needles, Arch Cape rocks, Jockey Cap rock, Seal rocks and other small islands within half a mile of shore.

It was announced today that the six-master schooner Oregon Pine will be drydocked ready to go into the trans-Pacific lumber trade in January, following her sister ship which is now bound for China with a cargo of lumber.

The schooner Undaunted has been chartered after a period of idleness to take a cargo of lumber for Calhoun, while the schooner Ecola is now loading a cargo of lumber for China.
