

Ford Display To Be Popular

The showroom of the Balsiger Motor company, local Ford dealer, will be just about the most popular place in the city this week. Ford National Show Week which opened January 10th and will continue through next Saturday evening, has brought out the greatest exhibit in the history of the Ford Motor company. Not only is a full line of improved cars being shown, but the trim lines of the various types are enhanced by such new appointments as top boots and gypsy curtains, windshield wings and windshield wiper supplied by the Ford Motor company. This special equipment, is being exhibited for the first time in Ford National Show Week and should prove mighty interesting even to those who are already driving improved Ford cars.

In addition to the cars and specialties, representative types of Ford Ton Trucks and Fordson tractors with both industrial and agricultural equipment will be displayed.

In Ford cars which will be shown during the National Show Week are incorporated improvements in body design and construction and chassis refinements more pronounced than any made in the history of the Model T chassis. Although thousands of these improved cars are in operation all over the country at the present time, there are still many persons who have not had opportunity to view the entire line and inspect in detail the improvements which have so greatly increased the popularity of Ford cars.

The first impression of the Ford cars for 1926 is one of increased beauty and smartness. Bodies are longer and lower, fenders hang low over the wheels and closed cars are finished in rich harmonious color schemes. But beauty is not the only quality to benefit by the redesigning. Riding comfort has been increased by wider, lower seats and greater legroom. New features of convenience have also been incorporated in these new cars. The gasoline tank is now filled from outside the car and in the open type a door at the driver's left permits entry or exit without disturbing the front seat passenger. Both transmission and rear wheel brakes have been enlarged.

Western Auto Employees Get Yearly Bonus

During the first week of January, the Western Auto Supply company distributed to its employees, a bonus in the form of common stock in the company.



Each employee who has been in the service of the company for one calendar year ending January 1, received a bonus amounting to one twelfth of his annual earnings.

This system of distribution has been in effect at the Western Auto Supply company during the past few years. This year over 500 employees will enjoy the bonus which according to George Pepperdine, president of the company amounted to something like \$100,000.

Since its inception, the officials of Western Auto have encouraged employees to become stockholders until today a goodly portion of the outstanding stock is in the hands of those who are actively engaged in the service of the company and who are responsible for the rapid growth of the concern.

The Western Auto Supply company advocates the theory that the interest of the employee and employer is mutual and that in order to expect the best co-operation from its employees, any concern must have the interest of its employees at heart.

For this reason, the company finds it not only profitable to pay its co-workers salaries as high, and in many cases higher than the average wage, but also to give a liberal bonus in stock.

The company urges its men to keep the stock and the dividends from year to year and accumulate a worth while interest in the business.

U. S. GETS PRIORITY

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12. — (AP) — The right of the federal government to claim priority over general creditors in several "consent receivership" cases was upheld today by the supreme court.

In arguing one of the cases, that of the Butterworth-Judson Corporation, the government contended that the "consent receiverships" was a new device to squeeze out minority creditors and a "scheme devised by financiers and reorganization committees with the aid of corporation lawyers to reorganize bankrupt corporations."

The court agreed to government priority in this case.

SUPREME COURT OPINIONS GIVEN

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 12. — The following opinions were handed down today by the supreme court: L. B. Powell, appellant, vs. W. A. West, appeal from Klamath county, motion to dismiss appeal arising out of disputed contract. Appeal dismissed in opinion of Chief Justice McBride.

Gowan Leaning Brown company vs. Martha A. Klingman, appellant; appeal from Douglas county; action to set aside conveyance made by bankrupt alleged to be in fraud of creditors. Opinion by Justice Burnett. Judge J. W. Hamilton reversed and suit dismissed.

George J. Casady claimant, plaintiff and petitioner, vs. State Industrial Accident commission; Original proceeding in mandamus, to compel Accident Commission to pay compensation for wife and two children. Opinion by Justice Burnett, writ dismissed.

L. B. Menefee Lumber company vs. O. V. Gamble appellant; appeal from Multnomah county suit to reform alleged contract. Opinion by Justice Brown. Judge George Rossman reversed.

State of Oregon vs. Elroy Haines appellant; appeal from Marion county appeal from conviction on statutory charge. Opinion by Justice Burnett. Judge George G. Bingham reversed.

Petition for rehearing denied in State vs. Wilson.

Woman Elected As Secretary To Fair Board

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 12. — (AP) — Mrs. Ella Schultz Wilson was again elected secretary of the state fair board at a meeting of the board here yesterday.

She is one of three women in the United States serving in similar offices.

Mrs. Wilson first became connected with the state fair organization about 11 years ago, when she was employed as an assistant to the late W. Al Jones. Throughout the five terms of A. H. Lee as secretary she was his assistant and also served with Fred Currey. When the latter resigned she succeeded him.

Wayne B. Stewart of Albany was chosen president of the board, Horace Addis of Portland vice-president and A. N. Bush of Salem, treasurer.

Dodge Prices Are Sweeping

New prices on Dodge Brothers Motor cars, the subject of widespread comment since it was made known December 15 that a sweeping reduction would be made, were announced. The reductions cover the entire list of Dodge Brothers cars and range from \$295 on the Special Type A Sedan to \$75 on the Commercial Cars and chassis.

The new and old prices on the different types of cars follow:

Touring car, new price \$795, old price, \$875; roadster, new price \$795, old price \$855; Type B Sedan, new price \$895, old price \$1045; Special Type A Sedan, new price \$1075, old price \$1280; coupe, new price \$845, old price \$960; panel commercial car, new price \$385, old price \$360; screen commercial car, new price \$310, old price \$385; chassis, new price, \$655, old price \$730.

It was stated in the announcement of December 15 that the new prices would be retroactive and that all purchasers of Dodge Brothers cars between that date and the time the revised schedules were made known would be refunded the difference between the new and old price. In accordance with this promise, thousands of checks are being made out today by Dodge Brothers dealers to such purchasers.

Although the announcement of December 15 of the impending price reductions, with their retroactive feature, fell on Thursday, the effect on sales was so immediate that shipments for that week showed a material increase over the preceding week.

The word that Dodge Brothers were about to make marked reductions in the prices of all their cars was something of a bombshell to the automobile industry, coming as it did at the time when several manufacturers were known to be
