

REPORT UNCONFIRMED

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 13.—(AP)—General Jose Alvarez, chief of the presidential staff, announces that subsequent reports have failed to confirm previous dispatches to the effect that eight of the bandits who massacred passengers, members of the train crew and the military guards on the Guadalajara-Mexico City passenger train Saturday night had been executed.

General Alvarez said he had been informed there were two executions. Federal troops are continuing to pursue the bandits.

SHIPS COLLIDE BELOW ASTORIA

ASTORIA, Jan. 13.—(AP)—Quick action on the part of their pilots probably avoided a serious accident last night when the steamer Welsh City, outbound, and the motorship Carriso, collided below here in the Columbia river.

The Welsh City has been put in here for a survey and the Carriso proceeded to Portland for repairs. The damage to the Carriso included seven bent frames, scores of rivets sheared and plates badly bent.

The Welsh City yesterday completed loading at Longview after dropping down from Portland, and was on her way to Australia. The Carriso was enroute to Portland from Honolulu, via San Francisco.

The fog was reported heavy and the vessels were almost together before the pilots learned of the impending danger. The ships were quickly veered from their courses and when they met it was with a glancing blow.

Both were shaken from stem to stern. Life boats were lowered and preparations were made for a general vacating of the ships. After the first preparations the skippers ordered surveys and it was found that neither was badly damaged.

Captain O. P. Rankin was in charge of the Carriso, owned by the Oceanic Steamship company, and Captain A. Lofstett was skipper of the Welsh City. The latter was under charter by the J. J. Moore company.

DOE WITH HORNS FOUND

BERKELEY.—A remarkable caprice of nature, a doe with horns, was shot recently and has been turned over to the museum of vertebrate zoology at the University of California. Prof. J. Grinnell of the zoology department said an examination showed that the animal was sterile, which probably accounted for the unusual growth of horns.

MARINE EARNINGS OFF

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FOUR ARRESTED IN POLICE RAID

ly trying to pay off his patrons, when Patrolman Morgan, who standing at the door, stepped over and annexed more money on the table and arrested the dealer.

KNOW "HIS EGGS"

Just one dealer "out tight." He was the dealer of the stud poker game, over in the corner of the card room and from the time the patrolmen entered the room to the time they left, not a chip or penny was seen on the face of the table.

Pandemonium ensued. The players were frightened for fear they would be arrested and their names published. Onlookers vied with each other to see how soon they could get out. The report of the raid spread quickly to the street and in a trice a number of Main street gambling games in progress shut down and the players dispersed.

PLAYERS FREED

But only the dealers of the three unlucky tables and Mark Hanna, proprietor of the establishment, were caught. Rather than take the quiet to jail, Chief Loncke assessed each man \$50 bail as security for their appearance before Police Judge Lem J. Gaghagen tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock.

Approximately \$100 was confiscated from the card tables by officers and also a large tray of chips found in the drawer of one of the dealer's tables. They were taken to the police station to be held for evidence in case the four men plan to fight the case.

The raid was orderly and efficient. There was no blatant display of guns, nor any violence. The police

took charge of the situation and the victims of the raid showed no sign of resistance, aside from the natural desire to get away from the place as soon as possible.

The Rex, pool and card room, is located in the basement of the Hart building on the corner of Seventh and Main streets. It was formerly known as the M. & H. Solo rooms and before that operated as a private club room. When Hanna took charge of the establishment, the name was changed to the Rex.

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TRY SAIL IN PLOWING

BRIGHTLINGSEA, England.—Sails were introduced as an aid to plowing in a soil tillers' match near this little seaside resort of which many of its residents are yeomen as well as farmers. The wind at times aided the horses in dragging the plow along but at other times puffs blew the implement to one side and spelled a straight furrow, which hindered the contestant's chance of winning first prize. Men as well as women participated in the contest, which the judges decided was a great success, but thought there was little possibility of sails ever putting horses or motors out of business when it comes to plowing.

JAPAN TO RE-FLOAT VESSEL

SUNK IN CHINO-JAP WAR TOKYO.—The British transport "Kowshing," which was sunk by Admiral Togo off the coast of Japan, Korea, during the Chino-Japanese war in 1894, is to be refloated by the Japanese navy. Expert divers are preparing for the work, which will require about two months, it is estimated. The transport is lying on the sea bottom at a depth of 24 fathoms and has on board silver bullion valued at about 1,500,000 yen. The sinking of the vessel was declared to have been due to the fact that it carried Chinese soldiers.

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
