## WANT TO BREAK RUBBER CONTROL

NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—(AP)—Definite plans involving the expenditure of millions of dollars by American industry to break the foreign crude rubber monopoly are now in progress and have received the approval of Secretary of Commerce Hoover.

The plans generally provide for stimulation of rubber production under American control in the Philippines.

The directors of the Rubber Association of America, meeting with Secretary Hoover, discussed proposals calling for the expenditure of \$5,000,000 in annual appropriations of \$10,000,000, to plant rubber trees in areas under American control.

In his address to the chamber, Secretary Hoover advocated two methods of meeting high rubber prices—conservation of rubber by scientific methods and acquisition by America of sources of rubber, which cannot be controlled by foreign influence. "I welcome these efforts on the part of our industries to themselves find solutions to the problems," he said. "The test of our whole economic and social system is in its capacity to cure its own abuses and meet its own problems."

### STIGMA OF "FOREIGN" REMOVED FROM CHRISTIANITY

NEW YORK.—Christianity is not a religion in China upon which the stigma of "foreign" may be placed, despite the attacks upon it made by some advocates of the "new nationalism," said Ralph A. Ward, of Peking, for 16 years a Methodist Episcopal missionary in China, in a report to the Board of Foreign Missions here. Dr. Ward pointed out that many of the leading men of the republic are well known as Christians, and that 2,300,000 Chinese, many of them prominent in public and private life, are enrolled as members of Christian churches.

## Moon To Come Into Eclipse

NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—(AP)—A few minutes before midnight tonight the moon will come between the sun and the earth and draw a black line of total eclipse some 7,000 miles in length from central Africa, across the Indian ocean and over the island of Sumatra and Borneo and to the edge of the Philippine Islands.

Astronomers from the United States, Holland, Australia and other countries have taken up positions at various points along the line where totality of the eclipse may be observed if weather conditions are propitious.

Starting in the Belgian Congo in central Africa at sunrise Thursday morning or 11:55 p. m. eastern standard time, the eclipse will pass over Victoria, Nyanza and then make its way across the Indian ocean southward until 1:05 p. m. eastern standard time. Then the shadow will bend northward and pass over the west coast of Sumatra, where it will then be 2:05 o'clock in the afternoon.

From Sumatra, the line of totality will jump across Borneo and thence to the Philippines, at the southern part of the island of Mindanao, where it will pass out into the Pacific ocean and leave the earth at sunset of 3:18 a. m. eastern standard time.

The period of totality in Africa will last for more than two minutes, in Sumatra, 3 minutes and 29 seconds; in Borneo 2 minutes and 40 seconds, and in Mindanao almost two minutes.

The shadow will be 80 miles wide, outside this radius the people of certain portions of east Africa, southern Greece, Arabia, Persia, India, China, Korea, Japan and Australia will be able to view the partial eclipse.
