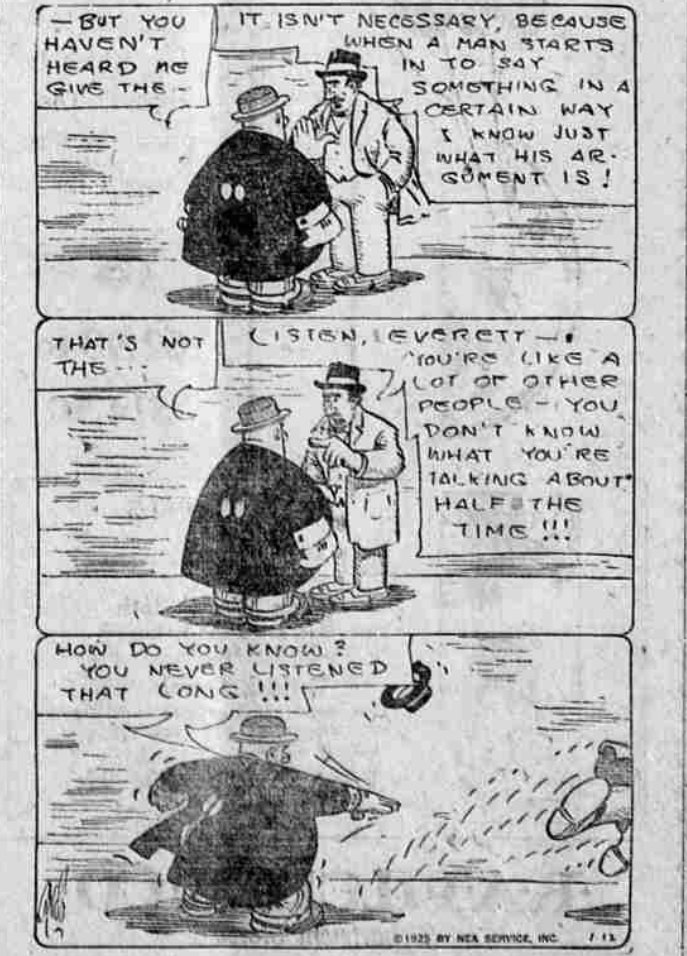
MEXICAN WOMEN CAMPAIGN AGAINST IMMORAL POSTCARDS MEXICO CITY. — A campaign against the sale or display of immoral postcards, pictures or publications, has been undertaken by the National Council of Mexican Women. Secretary of Education Paig, petitioned by the council to take action upon the ground that the youth of the country is being subjected to evil influences, expressed his sympathy with the movement and promised his governmental influence in its support. Governmental inspectors have been instructed to investigate the conditions complained of by the Women's council.

PROHIBITION HERE DECLARED A "WONDERFULLY GOOD THING" LEEDS.—(A)—Lord Mayor Gibson believes prohibition "is a wonderfully good thing" for the United States. The Lord Mayor has visited the United States every year for a long period and he told club members in an address after his last trip that in his opinion prohibition has been one of the main causes of "the wonderful success of the American people in the last few years." Francis E. Cox, chairman of the club, said he believed from what he had seen that prohibition had "cleansed the life of the working class in America."
